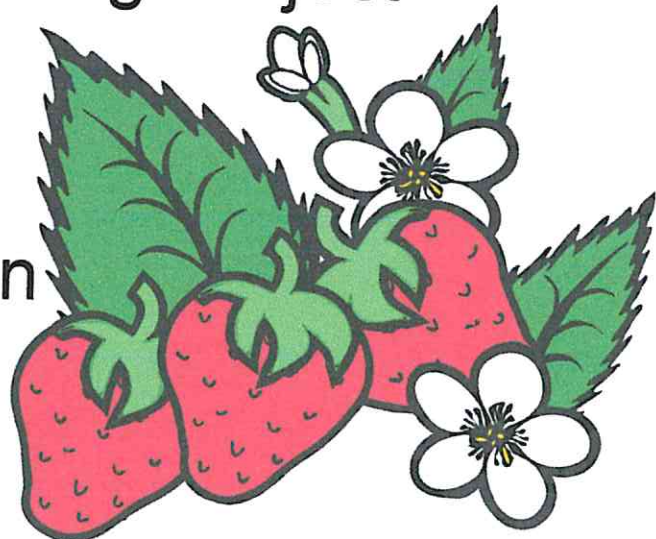

Dear all

As we continue to experience the hottest summer since 1976 it feels as though we are all having to change our expectations of what a British summer looks like. Today I wore shorts with my clergy shirt for the second time this month, something I am not at all used to doing. However, it did feel a lot cooler, especially under my robes at our Tuesday morning service.

One of the upsides to this warm spell is that the church building is warm! This is especially welcome as during July we will see our 30yr+ old heating system completely removed and replaced with a specially designed new heating system. This will also include some vital roofing works to the West porch where the main boiler resides.

A very warm welcome to Newbold Parish Church...

Being hospitable as a church is really important. We hope that we already offer an inviting environment, particularly in the way we welcome people into the church building, but we also want to make sure that, alongside a warm welcome, we're able to maintain a decent temperature! It is hoped that the work will be completed during this extraordinarily warm weather so that we are all set for when the temperatures eventually return to 'normal'.



Another result of the hot weather was that our Summer Fete was incredibly warm. So much so that the refreshments in the Eagle club became a welcome break from the incredible heat. The fete itself was a bit of a game of two halves... Having been on the first Saturday of July for decades, the last minute realisation that England's World Cup quarter final football match would begin half way through the 2pm-4pm fete time meant that we had a less busy year. However, the addition of a big screen showing the match certainly helped a few extra people decide to come along. It was great to hear the cheers as Harry Maguire, who went to school at St Mary's High School which is in the parish, scored!! Also, alongside our regular fete activities - cakes, teas, jams, mini-train rides, bouncy castle, brick-a-brack, ice creams, hot dogs, etc., this year we had music provided by local covers band 'Joint Decision' which included our Rector, Revd Ben Griffiths, on the drums. This was a break from the norm (and a bit too loud for some!) but a lot of people enjoyed themselves, with some of the children deciding to re-name Ben 'The Rocking Reverend'. All in all the event went well and, despite the soaring temperatures, much fun was had!





As a church we have been working on increasing our visibility in the community. To this end we have produced new leaflets advertising what we do as a church, including information about our various groups, social activities, baptisms and weddings etc. We have also increased our internet presence by renewing our website (which is still a work in progress) and by letting people know what is going on via our Facebook page, which now has 226 likes!

The most recent addition to our visibility has been our new church sign. We hope that it will make it easier for people to see what is going on and that people will like its vibrant colour (You'll have to see it's colour next time you are at church!). We will also be adding to the poster space with upcoming events...

THE WALKING GROUP

We parked the cars outside the Unstone Community Centre with Julie and Mary as our leaders. We negotiated the kissing gate and walked past a small-holding comprising of goats and a couple of horses and along a broadwalk which led us into Metapic Wood. This was planted in 2001 especially for friends and lovers of nature and wild life. It had been a very, hot day and we were grateful for the 4pm start and for the fact that we were walking in the shade of woodland. We sat on the "Rest-a-while" bench for a cold drink then crossed a stile and followed a footpath which brought us onto Callywhite Lane.

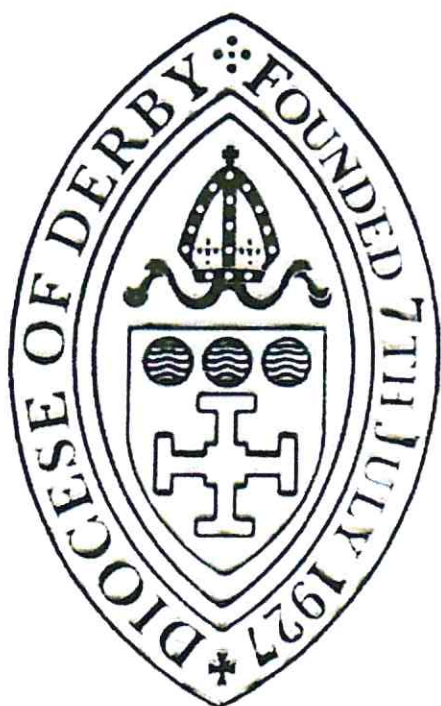
We entered Frith Wood and took a left fork to the pond, created to provide habitats for frogs, toads and newts but mainly occupied by used, black, doggy bags. If we had turned to the left of the pond we would have arrived at the Guides Field, owned by the Guides and often used during the summer for nature watch activities. During the First World War, prisoners of war were held in a camp built in this field.

We found a fallen tree which we all managed to perch on to eat our sandwiches before leaving the wood and climbing a grassy hill at the top of which we stopped to admire the view and to get our breath back. After striding over various stiles we passed Summerley Hall which with Summerley Farm dates from the early 17th century. (Summerley means summer pasture).

We walked through four fields, all with stiles and down a path bordered on both sides by sizeable nettles, eventually arriving back at our cars. Thanks to Julie and Mary for a very pleasant, mainly shady, walk on a beautiful evening in July.

Next month's walk on Sunday 5th August will start at **4pm** and will be in the area of Oakerthorpe. This is a 4 ½ mile, fairly easy walk, so if anyone wishes to join us please meet at the church gates with sandwiches and a drink. Transport will then be arranged.

THE BISHOP'S BADGE CHURCH SCHOOL AWARDS.



The Diocese of Derby was founded in 1927 and in celebration, the first Bishop, Edmund Courtenay Pearce arranged for a medal to be struck and given to distinguished members of the Diocese and confirmation candidates in that year.

In recent years Bishop Alastair arranged for a replica to be made in the form of a badge awarded on recommendations made to him to acknowledge outstanding service to the church.

To mark the 90th anniversary of the Diocese during this academic year the Bishop's Badge Awards have been extended to our Church Schools. Head teachers were invited to nominate a child in their school who they felt best exemplified the church school value of the year, community, in an age appropriate way. School projects that build community were to be recognised with certificates.

We are delighted that a year five pupil from our church school received an award from Bishop Jan at a service held in St John's, Tideswell on 12th July. His recommendation read:

Matthew enthusiastically volunteers himself to support the smooth running of our school community, forsaking his own free time for the needs of others. Matthew has served on our school worship team, been a lunchtime monitor, attended our Eco committee, supported children in EYFS, worked as a litter picker and been both a classroom buddy and a classroom monitor.

Twenty one children gained the award, and their individual contributions to their communities were varied and inspirational.

In addition Newbold Church School was one of only five schools to receive an award, also at Tideswell Church. The Early Help Team has worked to develop a nurture resource, enabling the school to offer early help to families needing support. They offer support, play therapy, emotional literacy, pet therapy and access to the Food Bank. They also offer our children support and SOS time, giving vulnerable children enhanced access to a greater wealth of life experiences, thereby helping them to overcome social obstacles to learning and ensuring they are valued and able to participate as fully as possible within the school community.

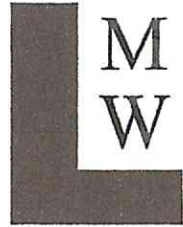

How to use 'The Bible in a year'

The Bible is broken up into readings for each day of 2018. The idea is to make it more manageable to read your Bible. Each day there is an Old Testament and a New Testament reading.

One of the easiest ways of getting into it is to read each passage slowly, take some time to think about what you have read, pray, and then ask these three questions:

What did the passage mean to those who heard it first?
(what context were they living in and how might it have spoken to them?)

What might it mean for me today?
(Consider the themes of the passage. Does it speak to you?)

What am I going to do about it?
(Is there something in the passage that I need to respond to - through prayer, through action, through discussion with someone else?)

These three questions are obviously not the only way to read the Bible, but they are a way of helping us to make a start...



A Prayer

Lord God, help me to read the Bible expecting to learn more about You. Give me the desire to keep on exploring the Bible. Help me to find ways to understand how you spoke to others in the past, and how you speak to me today. Amen

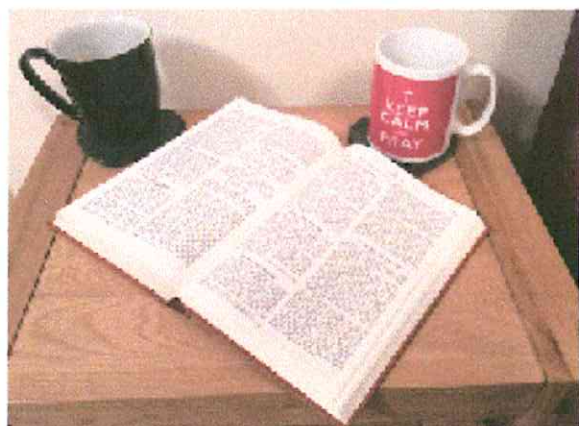

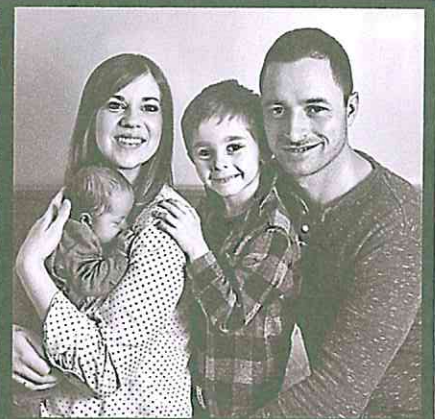
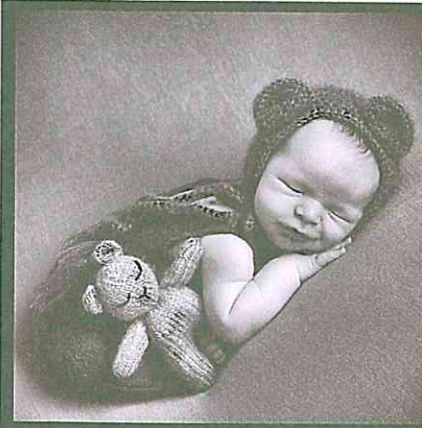

BLUEBELL WOOD by Richard Peet

Lucy Rathbone who is a community fundraiser at Bluebell Wood visited the Monday Club earlier this year to talk about her work. We also had a Coffee Morning hosted by two of the volunteers, Carol and Gwyn who between them raised £300.00.

We were given an invite from Lucy to visit the hospice, so Ben and I took up the opportunity on 20th June.

They are based in North Anston and cover South Yorkshire, North Derbyshire, North Nottinghamshire and North Lincolnshire and also run a shop on Packers Row in Chesterfield. They care for children and young adults with life shortening and life threatening conditions and importantly their families.

When we arrived we immediately had the feeling that this place is a living, loving, caring, happy, active busy place.

There are eight bedrooms, including accommodation for families who are then able to stay overnight. The rooms are equipped for the children and can be personalised for the length of time they are using them. There are two end of life suites named, Primrose and Forget Me Not which are purpose built for families. In the main part of the hospice there is a lounge, music room, sensory room, cinema room, a jacuzzi and a messy play area.

The hospice is surrounded by six and a half acres of land which has a playhouse, a marquee, lovely gardens and play areas and a Dragonfly Remembrance Garden created by Alan Titchmarsh. Other services include respite care, day care, support in the community, counselling and bereavement care.

The staff continue to support families after a bereavement for as long as they need it and many parents then support the hospice, to help raise much needed funds or by becoming volunteers themselves.

The overall impression we came away with was that the hospice is a happy, loving, caring place, where families are able to create lasting memories of their child. This is a charity worthy of our support.

FURTHER NEWS ABOUT THE WINTER NIGHT SHELTER

Talks have taken place between Phil Morton, the Head of Relief of Poverty at Derby City Mission and various churches in Chesterfield with regard to starting up a winter night shelter for the homeless. So far, these churches have signed up to be involved – Friends Meeting House, Central Methodist Church, St. Leonard's, Spital, Grace Chapel, Holy Trinity & Christ Church with two churches yet to confirm. Chesterfield, Bolsover and North East Derbyshire councils have agreed to supply £25.000 towards possible costs of £30 - £40.000.

DCM trustees have agreed to act as lead organisation for this winter, including public liability insurance and employing overnight staff. Advertising will start soon to allow time for recruitment, interviews and DBS checks to arrive in time.

The next step is to gather volunteers who will be needed from 7pm - 10pm, one night a fortnight, who would not need to be DBS checked. A management team needs to be set up to help coordinate things on the ground. Phil will chair the team for this winter but if you know of anyone with specific skills in organising food, volunteer rotas, administration, finance or fundraising, please contact him. It is expected this will all be in place for the coming winter.

There is no need to have a Christian faith to volunteer but you do need to understand that this venture is a Christian project. Please pray for everyone involved and for a successful outcome.

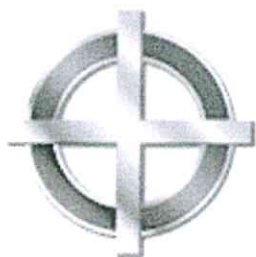
