



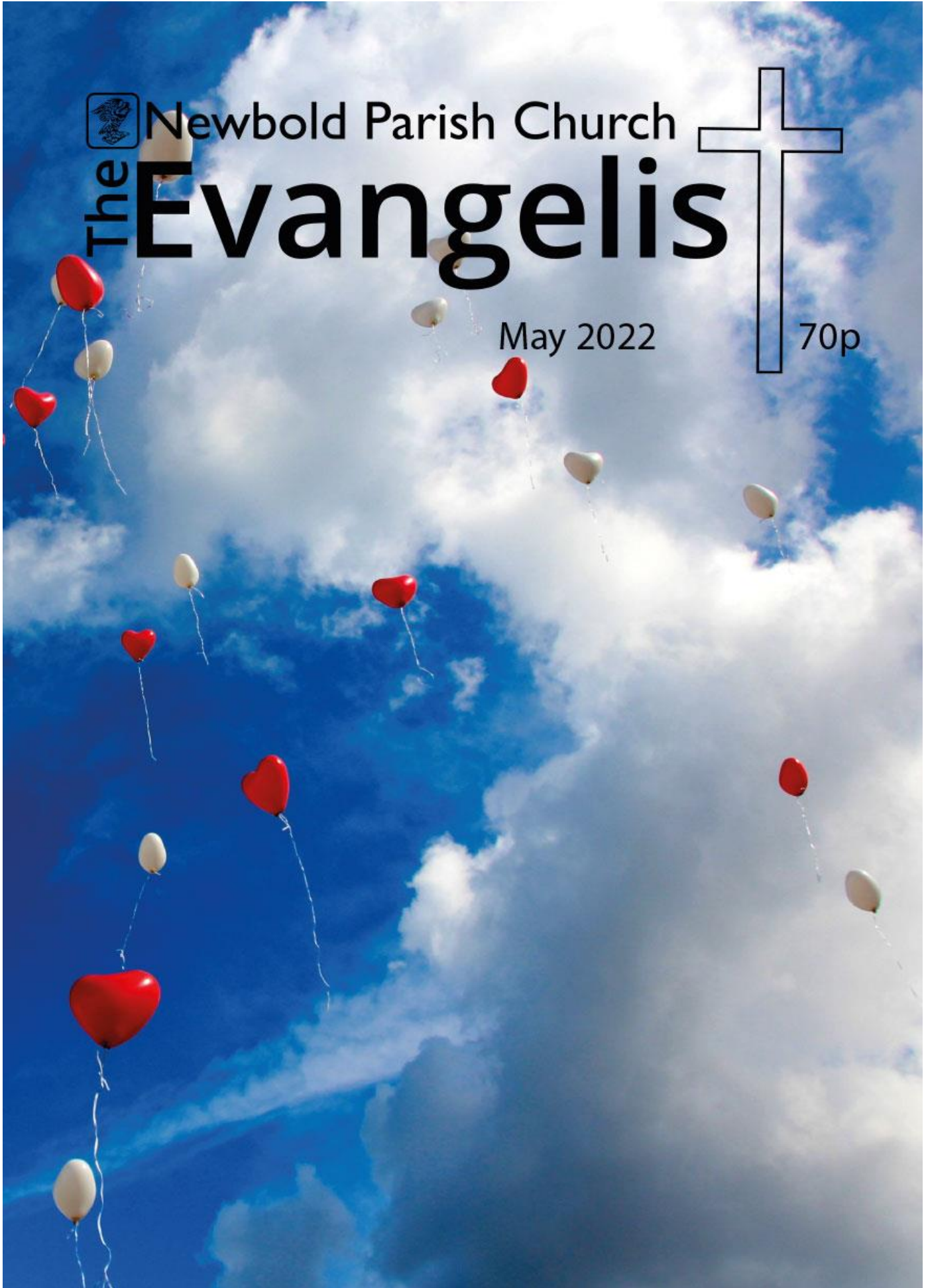

From the curate

Rev'd Rhoda

I'm writing this after celebrating my first Holy Week and Easter in the church building, and at the stage where I've nearly finished my curacy. Those two pieces of information sum up the past two and a half years. It has felt at times like an endless Holy Saturday, an interim period, when what is to come is not yet known.



But this Easter was worth the wait! I valued the different services of Holy week as we travelled towards the crucifixion, and then the Easter vigil and the great celebration of Easter Day, and I would like to express my thanks to all who attended the services and those who helped in any way to ensure that everything went as smoothly as possible—you are a great community. Christ is Risen! He is risen indeed, Alleluia.

And yet, I find it very reassuring that for the first followers of Jesus, receiving the reality of the resurrection wasn't just an Easter morning event. The risen Jesus spent 40 days with them, eating with them, forgiving and comforting them, teaching them, healing them.

And, in the church calendar, we take this journey too over the 40 days from Easter Day to Ascension Day. There is room here for unbelief and doubt as well as certainty and joy. So, if it's all too much for you to take in at one time then can I invite you to take as long as you need to let the joy of the resurrection get a foothold in your heart.



This year, as in previous years, we are planning on joining in with the global **Thy Kingdom Come Prayers** in the period from **Ascension Day Thursday 26th May until Pentecost 5th June.**

There are three sets of resources for this:

- **The Novena booklet** offers nine days of reflections on the book of 1 Peter, written by the Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby.
- **The Prayer Journal** will help you focus your personal prayers throughout Thy Kingdom Come, with short Bible verses, reflections, responses and prayers.
- To help younger readers grow in faith, the **Cheeky Pandas** return this year in an exciting Jubilee-themed adventure.

These resources were offered free this year with just the cost of postage, so we hope to be able to distribute them soon.

For **Dying Matters Awareness Week, 2nd to 6th May**, Rebecca Tustin from Lilleker's funeral directors and I are in the process of getting together an event in a unit in the pavements with people from other organisations such as the hospice. It is an opportunity to get our community talking about dying and grief. We want everyone to be #InAGoodPlace when they die – whatever that means for them. Right now, we know that people are dying without the support they need. And we know that it's by talking, and by

sharing stories, that we can remove the taboo and stigma that surround these topics. We can also better understand what's happening in our communities so that political and healthcare leaders know what is needed to make end of life care accessible to everyone. Dying Matters Awareness Week is our chance to get talking, to share stories, and to call for end of life care for all.

From the Church Warden

We are now in the month of May, and hopefully the weather will continue to improve.

On **Thursday 26th May** we are hoping to have a service for **Ascension Day at 7.30pm** which marks 40 days after Easter Day. Christ ascends into heaven to take his seat at the right hand of God.

During April, we completed the season of Lent, leading to Holy Week and Easter Sunday.

This was Rhoda's first **Holy Week**, due to the pandemic.

We began with Palm Sunday, processing from the Eagle Club into church, where a wonderful service took place with the dramatic passion according to Mark.

On the Sunday evening the 4pm service started with the Easter Trail in the churchyard, where a journey was taken as follows: At each egg a bible story and reflection was said

EGG 1 The story of **Palm Sunday**, hopes and dreams.

EGG 2 **Jesus washes his disciples' feet.**

EGG 3 **The last supper.**

EGG 4 **Sharing sorrow.**

EGG 5 **Resurrection**, the empty tomb

We had 65 adults and children taking part, and then we had an Easter egg hunt in the church, with refreshments. What a joyous event this was, and much credit must go to Rhoda, but also her team Chris, Hilary and Gill, and those who helped construct and paint the eggs. (For more pictures see p31)



During Holy Week we had our Maundy Thursday service with the washing of feet, and a Good Friday service about the trial and death of Jesus on the cross. Holy Saturday was a day of reflection and waiting, with the Easter Vigil service in the evening, and the Easter Day service was a celebration of Christ's resurrection. Also, we had Stations of the Cross led by a number of people on Monday afternoons, Tuesday morning prayer on zoom, Wednesday morning mass, and our Lent group also on Wednesday, which was based on the mission action plans (MAPS) for the Derby Diocese and using the mission action toolkit which is a set of resources that can help any church to join in to responding to the missional aims of the Diocesan vision.

We must thank all those involved in preparing the services, to Steve our verger, Stuart our organist, Chris our reader, our crucifers, and all who took part in the services, reading the lessons, leading us in prayer, sidespeople, deputy wardens, the parish breakfast teams, and the flower arrangers who did magnificent displays for Easter Sunday.

A big thank you to our curate Rhoda, who led us in her first full Lent, Holy Week, and Easter Day.

On the **15th May we will be having our APCM**, where the reports of the year are given. These will be available in a booklet beforehand. Church Wardens are elected, and new PCC members are elected to the vacant positions. On the PCC, other offices are elected to act as chair and deputy, secretary and deputy, electoral roll officer, health and safety officer, treasurer and deputy, independent examiner.

We have much to look forward to and much work to do, such as the Newbold Parish Centre development, the appointment of a new incumbent and the quinquennial visit which takes place this month.

Coffee Mornings restart on Saturday 7 May, and preparations for our **Summer Fete on Saturday 2nd July** begin, the first since 2019. I hope there is excitement, a sense of "let us get out there and make this the best ever" and a sense of enjoyment, and that people are looking forward to this very important event in the church calendar.

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The Archbishop of Canterbury's Ecumenical Easter Letter 2022

Archbishop Justin Welby's Easter letter to partners and heads of churches around the world.

“Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb” [John 20:1]

This Easter we turn once again towards the light of Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, in a world marked by darkness and conflict. For some of our churches, Easter has long been celebrated in the shadow of war and instability. For others, this may be the first time in many decades that the resurrection and promise of Christ has been celebrated amidst the cruel reality of bloodshed, displacement and struggle.

We pray particularly for those suffering in Ukraine this Easter, as well as the many other places that face war and conflict across the world. We pray for the widows of Yemen, the orphaned of Ethiopia and those from Afghanistan who are facing famine or have become foreigners in search of safety. We hold before God the countless other places across the world where such deep suffering is seen and grieved by Him who knows our pain on the Cross. We also remember those suffering the ongoing effects of the pandemic, and our brothers and sisters across the world who face the grave and present threat of the climate crisis.

In this broken world, the way of the Cross is a calling to each of us. The foot of the Cross becomes a place to gather as one body and one people, facing different sufferings but united in our need for God’s healing and transformation.

We see in the wounds of humanity the risen Christ who still bears the scars of crucifixion. We see in the costly, sacrificial generosity of churches in Europe and around the world the redeeming promise of our Lord. In their support and hospitality in times of need, we see the Christ who is our refuge and our strength.

We give thanks to God for those religious leaders who have reached out to refugees and spoken out against evil, even at great personal danger to themselves and we are reminded that our fellowship in the Gospel when we speak and act together is more powerful than any wickedness.

For these signs of great hope, we give thanks. We celebrate life conquering death, wherever and whenever we see it.

Our calling this Easter remains the same as Christ's call to his disciples: to be people who witness to the resurrection. When we, too, see and believe (John 20:9), we can be bringers of new life. We too are called to stand with the oppressed, the marginalised and the forgotten. We too are called to cry out for God's justice and mercy to prevail, to denounce injustice and reject inequality in all the ways they appear in our world.

In St John's Gospel, Jesus appears to a mourning woman and she is consoled. His beloved disciple, fearful and confused, sees and believes. Thomas doubts, and yet in the wounds of Jesus he finds the truth of Christ. Jesus welcomes those without status and without value in the eyes of the world. God's message is made known to the wounded, the grieving, the confused, the rejected.

We have a saviour who does not turn his back on suffering and scarring, but bears it all, and so transforms it.

While it was still dark and all seemed hopeless on the first Easter Sunday, Jesus had already risen. Death had already been defeated. And the first day of God's new creation had already begun.

May we each hear the wounded yet risen Christ call us by name this Easter, and may we greet him with joy on this new dawn of God's creation.

Alleluia! Christ is risen indeed!

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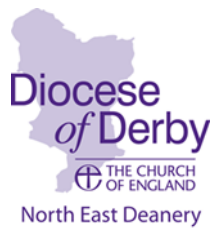
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Join the Diocese of Derby '2027 Community of Prayer'

Almighty God, who through your only-begotten Son Jesus Christ have overcome death and opened to us the gate of everlasting life: grant that, as by your grace going before us you put into our minds good desires, so by your continual help we may bring them to good effect; through Jesus Christ our risen Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

(or)

Risen Christ, your wounds declare your love for the world and the wonder of your risen life: give us compassion and courage to risk ourselves for those we serve, to the glory of God the Father.

Sunday 22 May Sixth of Easter

Acts 16.9-15 Psalm 67 Revelation 21.10,22 - 22.5 John 14.23-29 or John 5.1-9

God our redeemer, you have delivered us from the power of darkness and brought us into the kingdom of your Son: grant, that as by his death he has recalled us to life, so by his continual presence in us he may raise us to eternal joy; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

(or)

Risen Christ, by the lakeside you renewed your call to your disciples: help your Church to obey your command and draw the nations to the fire of your love, to the glory of God the Father.

Sunday 29 May Seventh of Easter

Acts 1.1-11 or Daniel 7.9-14 Psalm 47 or Psalm 93

Ephesians 1.15-23 or Acts 1.1-11 Luke 24.44-53

Grant, we pray, almighty God, that as we believe your only-begotten Son our Lord Jesus Christ to have ascended into the heavens, so we in heart and mind may also ascend and with him continually dwell; who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Risen Christ, you have raised our human nature to the throne of heaven: help us to seek and serve you, that we may join you at the Father's side, where you reign with the Spirit in glory, now and for ever.

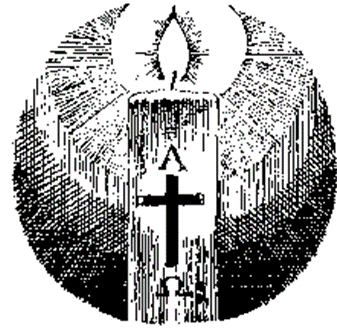

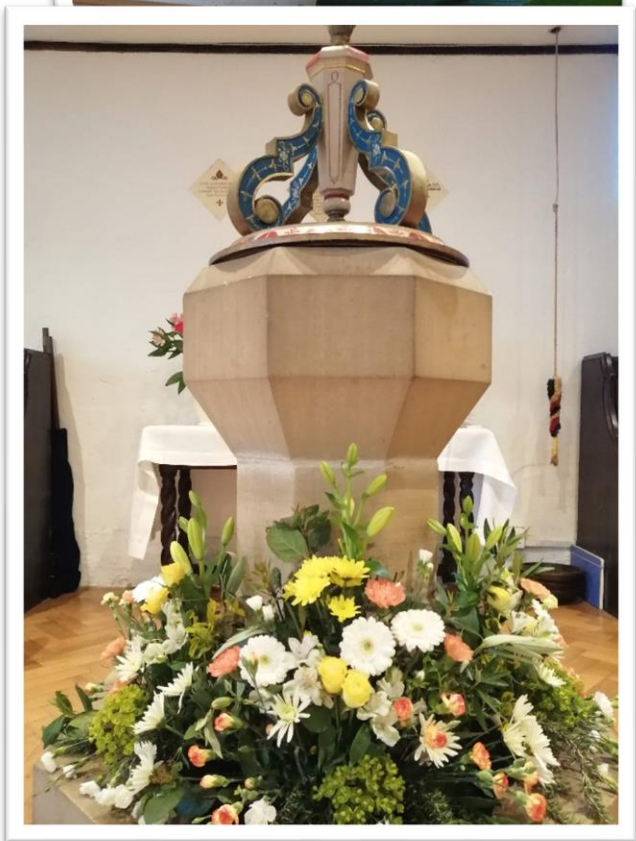
A Prayer for Ukraine

It was a chilly start to the bird watch on April 2nd but by the end it had thankfully warmed up considerably. There were only four of us this month as Trish had to be somewhere else.

Right from the beginning it seemed we were going to have a good morning, the birds were singing and as we turned the corner from the front of the church to the side, Wendy spotted what turned out to be a tree creeper, a very secretive bird we haven't seen for ages.

There were birds we heard rather than saw, the chiff chaff, which has a very distinctive song, seemed to be singing overhead but try as we might we could not see it. The others were the chaffinch, robin and nuthatch.

All in all on Saturday we spotted or heard twenty two birds and they were: house sparrow, carrion crow, starling, wood pigeon, dunnock, tree creeper, blue tit, chiff chaff, jackdaw, blackbird, rook, goldfinch, buzzard, sparrowhawk, chaffinch, great tit, magpie, nuthatch, herring gull, black headed gull, robin and long tailed tit.

As we left the churchyard the painters were there to do the easter eggs for the Easter Experience. John joined them, and Wendy and I went home.

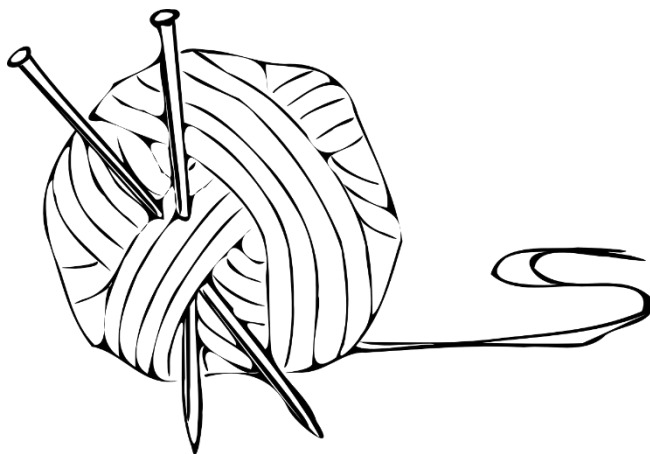

expected to have enough wool left at the end to knit something for a young child.



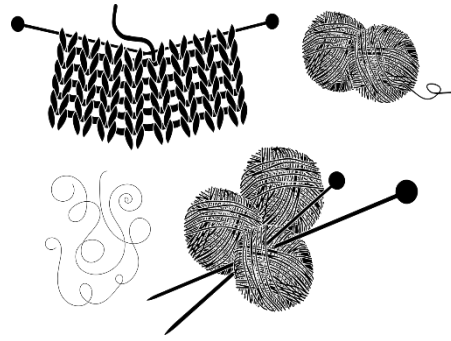
Evelyn was with us this week too. She did not have a project but came and chatted with us and kept us company.

Knitting Reflection

Last month I shared some reflections I had whilst taking part in a Lent knitting project. The group continued to share their experiences and reflections through Lent, in a dedicated Facebook group, as we encouraged and inspired each other. I thought I would share this post from Vic Everitt, with her permission, where she managed to find a spiritual blessing during a knitting catastrophe!

“So last night I learnt another important life and faith lesson. I took my Knitalong to the Craft and Chat group I am part of, only to discover that some stitches right at the beginning had dropped and run. My attempts to pick them up were not successful and so one of the lovely ladies said she would pick back the rows for me because she knew how disheartening it is to unpick your own work. (She also trusted me with the cable she was doing!) Once unpicked, we then had to painstakingly work out which row I was back to, where another member of the group, who is also doing the Knitalong, helped. This morning I am all caught up and no-one need ever know.

And so, I was reminded that in faith and life, asking for help is not a weakness and there will always be times when we benefit from the skills and wisdom of others. And the power of simple acts of service, as this same friend silently picked up my ball and unwound some wool for me once I got going again.”

I would love to share more of my reflections and a picture of the finished project, but I hope to run this myself for local knitters next year. I would reveal too much about the project, and the power of the project is in the mystery, a little like our walk with Jesus.

Yarn Wrap Peace Doves

Here's a simple tactile prayer activity for all ages & stages to pray for the people of Ukraine from the internet site www.sunhatsandwellieboots.com, which was available as an activity at the Deanery Prayers for Ukraine event outside the Crooked Spire on Saturday 16th April.

These Yarn Wrap Peace Doves are designed for children but could be used as a reflective prayer activity for adults too. Use them as a prayer prompt to have at home or hang them in trees around your neighbourhood.

You'll need lengths of blue & yellow yarn, recycled cardboard (a cardboard box is ideal for this), & a dove template.

As you wrap the yellow yarn around your dove you could pray this simple prayer:

God of hope,

Surround the people of Ukraine with love.

Surround the people of Ukraine with peace.

Surround the people of Ukraine with courage.

Amen

Add the blue length of yarn in the same way, as you wrap it around the dove you might like to pray this simple prayer:

God of hope,

Surround world leaders with wisdom.

Surround world leaders with compassion.

Surround world leaders with justice.

Amen

4 ideas for your Yarn Wrapped Peace Doves:

1. Hang them in your home or in a window to help you pray for the situation in Ukraine.
2. Hang them in trees around your neighbourhood, your churchyard or school playground.
3. Send your peace dove to your MP to highlight the needs of the Ukrainian people.
4. Send your dove to a Ukrainian family to let them know they're not alone.



There were some kits left over from the Saturday prayer event, and they will be available at the back of church, along with some prayer sheets with other prayers.

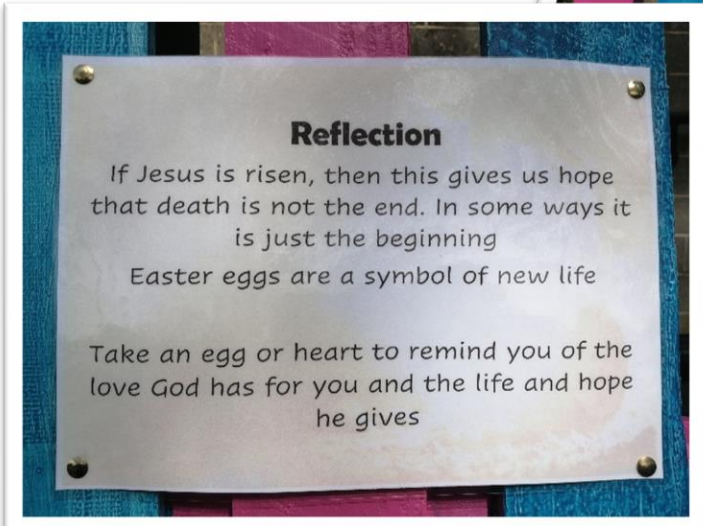
