I'm writing this with a sense of anticipation and excitement as we start the new church year on Sunday 27th November, the beginning of Advent.

Advent is a season of expectation and preparation as the Church looks forward to celebrating the birth of Christ.

In England, Advent falls at the darkest time of the year, and, as we naturally long for the returning of the light, it powerfully reminds us of the advent of one who is the light that shined into our darkness, Jesus, the light of the world.

Here at St John's, we use an 'Advent wreath' of candles to mark the Sundays of Advent, lighting a new candle each week as we trace the history of our faith leading up to the birth of Jesus, the Christ.

This year we are able to do so much more when compared with 2021, when we were in the omicron wave of the pandemic with the eventual advice just before Christmas to limit our social contacts.

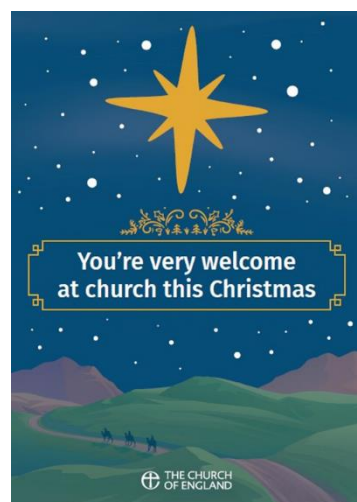
We have a full programme of Christmas services planned (see page 3), from services particularly suited to families with primary aged children (**Messy Church Christmas**), to those suitable for all ages together (**Christingle service**) and the old traditional favourites (**Carols by Candlelight and Midnight Mass**). We are also offering a 'Blue Christmas' service this year for those who find that the joy of Christmas celebrations doesn't fit how they are feeling, for whatever reason. We will also have our weekly Holy Communion services on Sunday and Wednesday at 10am.

The Church of England national theme for Advent and Christmas this year is “Follow the Star: the great invitation”. The invitation to our services is open to all, whatever service you particularly feel might suit. Please ask us for further information on the format of any if you wish.

Our Archbishops Justin Welby and Stephen Cottrell have joined up with other guests to produce a booklet of 12 reflections on the theme of invitation, one for each of the 12 days of Christmas from Christmas Eve through to Epiphany on 6th January. This booklet accompanies your copy of the Evangelist this month as a gift from St John’s.

From the Churchwarden

The season of Advent marks the start of the Christian year which is year A this year. The year began on the first Sunday of Advent on 27th November.

Sunday the 4th December is the Second Sunday of Advent, 11th the Third Sunday of Advent, 18th Fourth Sunday of Advent, 25th The Nativity of the Lord, 26th St Stephen the final Martyr, and 27th St John the Apostle Evangelist.

Christmas is a special time and for many the loveliest time to visit our local church. Some services which families may wish to come to are, 4th December **Messy Church** at 4pm, 11th December **Christingle** at 4pm, and our **Carol Service on Christmas Eve** at 6pm.

It is lovely to welcome families to church at any time during the year, but Christmas in many ways is extra special when we have the opportunity to come to traditional and festive services and remember that Jesus Christ was born.

Advent in the liturgical year is a time of expectant waiting and preparation and coming which celebrates the birth of Jesus Christ.

We may feel anticipation, hope, and joy, but for many this year this may be difficult due to rising bills.

The word Advent comes from the Latin term *adventus* meaning arrival or coming.

During December we will be holding many different services which you will find listed in this copy of our magazine, on page 3. We hope you have the opportunity to join us as often as you are able during this season.

Schools will also be holding nativity plays, or a crib service.

During November the Crooked Spire held their spectacular Christmas tree festival, and in church we held our Christmas Fayre where the church and community came together for a wonderful time (see page 13).

Our church school are having their infant Christmas production, a mass in school, a panto, and the juniors will have their carol service in church.

Cavendish and Dunston Schools are coming into church for Christmas services, and the Newbold Parish Church preschool, based in the Eagle Club, are also coming to church.

In November we had our **Remembrance Service** on 13th in church at 10am, followed by the Littlemoor memorial service at 12pm where over 100 people were in attendance including many scouts, and the **Service of Memory and Hope** where we had invited people to come to remember their loved ones, relatives or friends who had died during the past year. We had over 90 people attend this wonderful service.

May we look forward to this wonderful and special time of year, and hope 2023 may be a brighter year for us all; and may we love each other and remember to say thank you.

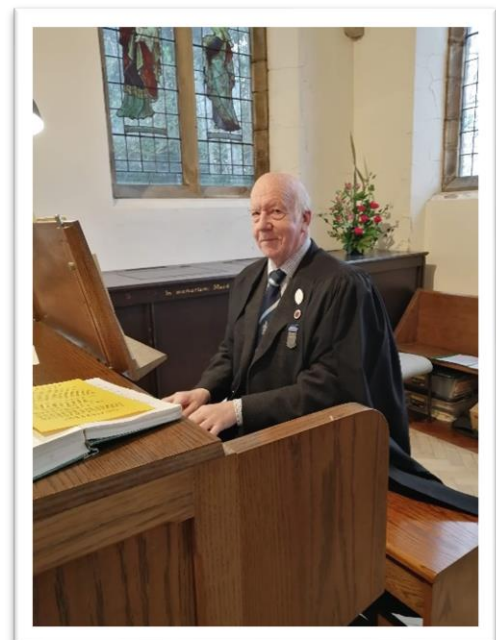

We have started to look at how we can be more sustainable and eco-friendlier by reducing and maybe stopping using floral foam – oasis. We hope to share more in the January magazine.

The Walking Group

Six of us met outside church on the 6th November on a cloudy afternoon for our walk. We set off in two cars, parking on the edge of the recreation ground in Youlgreave to eat our packed lunch. Whilst eating our sandwiches it started to rain, but not much at first. Not deterred by the rain, we put our wet weather gear on and started the walk.

We walked along the main street of the village, noticing the quaint names of the cottages – The Old Dairy, The old Grocer’s Shop, The Milking Parlour and The Pretty Pint Cottage. The pub was named The Farmyard Inn.

The water supply for the village was once taken straight from the river but in the early 1800’s a new supply from a local spring was stored in the round stone tank in Fountain Square. The community owned Youlgreave Waterworks Ltd is one of the few

private water companies left in the country.



Continuing along the main street we stopped to admire the scalloped roof tiles of a cottage, then pictures were taken of a witch sat on a roadside bench, a leftover of Halloween!

Further on, just past the village car park we went through a gate and

started our descent through dense woodland into the dale. At the bottom we walked upstream along the north bank of the River Bradford, passing a lone swan.

Soon we crossed an old stone bridge and walked downstream on the south bank of the river passing numerous weirs. The River Bradford is only 4 miles long, rising on Gratton Moor before joining the River Lathkill at Alport. As we continued our walk the rain got steadily heavier, we passed other walkers, all of us wondering about our sanity as we got steadily wetter.



Up on our left, through the mist, the houses of Youlgreave could be seen overlooking the dale. After passing through a gate we crossed the river on a clapper bridge before resuming our walk along the river, now back on the north bank. We passed a swimming area, where the river has been dammed to create a deep pool before crossing a road.

We were now on a wide track following the river. On our left in a field, a herd of dark brown sheep stood forlornly as the rain steadily fell. After passing low cliffs we reached the main road at Alport.

As we walked up the main road the rain finally stopped, and we glimpsed a glimmer of brightness as the cloud cover

parted slightly. We went through a gate and now walked high above the dale on the north side of the river, crossing fields until we emerged on a road in Youlgreave. Here we had another pause for pictures as we stopped by a tractor with a plastic pheasant as its bonnet ornament.

We walked up the road, then through the churchyard of the late 12th Century All Saints' Church, before retracing our way back to our cars.

If anyone wishes to join us then meet us outside church at 12pm with a packed lunch on **Sunday 4th December**. You will be made very welcome.

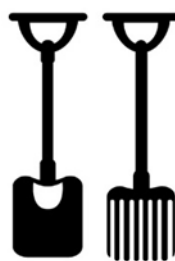

As it was raining on the first Saturday of the month, the birdwatch was deferred until the following Saturday and it was John, Wendy and Trish who did the birdwatch as I wasn't feeling too well. The morning started off clear, bright and reasonably warm, but turned chilly later. There were still too many leaves on the trees for easy birdwatching but even so we did see flocks of long tailed tits.

We do need to remember and mentally note that the second Saturday is now the day for the church yard tidy up group. As well as there being more people about there were people with leaf blowers and chain saws – not ideal when bird watching! If the first Saturday is not suitable for some reason or other, we need to look at midweek or the third Saturday. Unsurprisingly though the refreshments on offer in the Parish Room for this group were very welcome on a chilly morning.

Birds that were seen were: blackbird, blue tit, crow, collared dove, dunnock, feral pigeon, goldfinch, long tailed tit, magpie, robin, starling, wood pigeon and wren; thirteen birds in all.



Tiffin Recipe

This is a great recipe for using up the bits from the bottom of a biscuit tin or cereal packet.

Ingredients:

350g mixed biscuits (digestives, ginger nuts or shortcake)

100g raisins

100g glacé cherries

100g dark plain chocolate

60ml golden syrup (4 tablespoons)

150g butter

200g bar of milk chocolate

2 greased tins or dishes approximately 20cm square

Makes about 32

Method:

Crush the biscuits with a rolling pin or pestle. Break up the dark chocolate and melt in a large pan with the butter and syrup. When it is quite smooth, stir in the biscuit crumbs, raisins and cherries. Mix thoroughly, then press into the tin and leave to cool slightly. Melt the milk chocolate bar in a glass bowl or jug sitting in boiling water. When it is melted spread over the top of the tiffin and leave to cool. When it is cooled but still soft, mark up into squares and transfer to a fridge to harden. It is much easier to mark into pieces before hardening – I have made the mistake in the past of trying to cut into pieces after it has been in the fridge and ended up with a bent knife and sore hand!
