



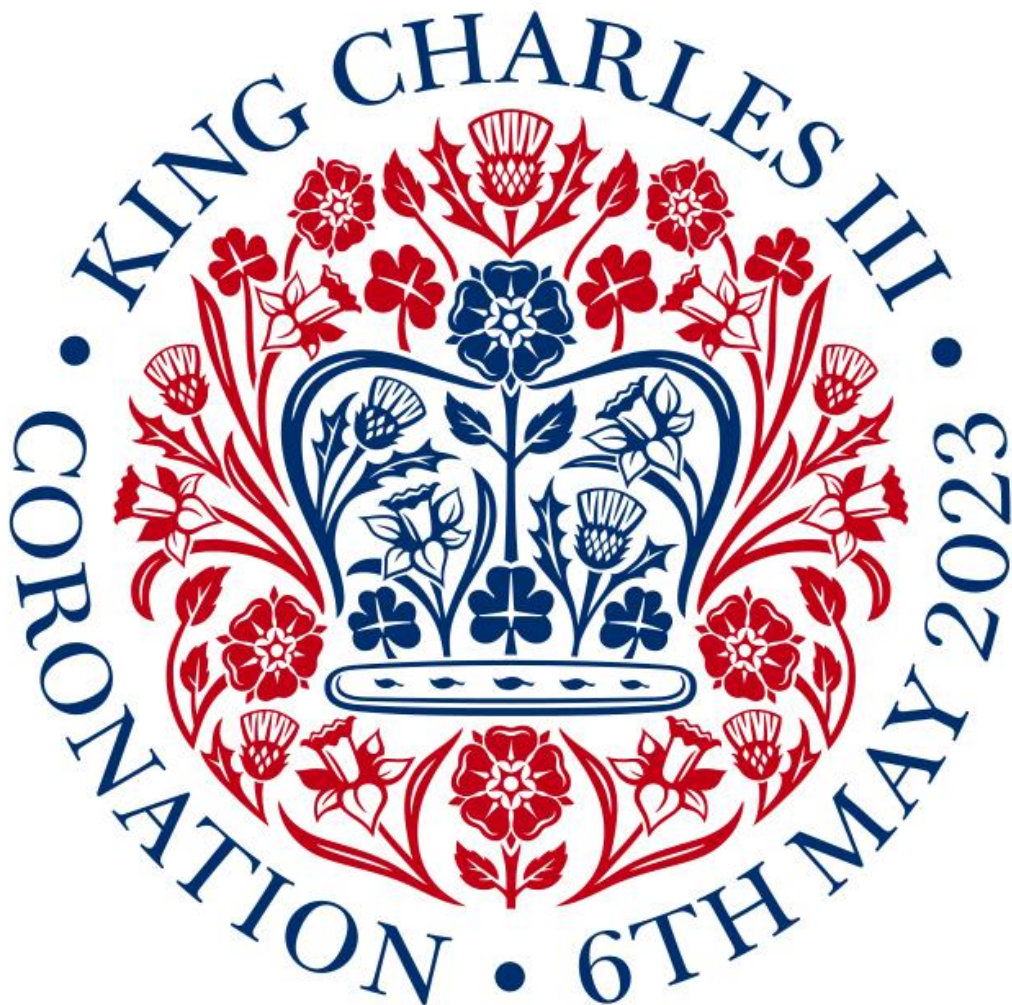

# From the Vicar Designate

## *Revd Rhoda*

As I'm writing this, we are in the period of 28 days of prayers before the coronation of King Charles III on May 6th at Westminster Abbey. These prayers began on Easter Sunday, and are available online and in a booklet produced by the Church of England.

The booklet mentions that in 1947 the then Princess Elizabeth dedicated herself to the service of the people; a promise she kept for over 70 years. In his first speech following her death, King Charles mentioned that he had been brought up to cherish a sense of duty to others, and he also pledged to serve the nation.

For the late Queen and her son King Charles, their sense of duty and service stems from their Christian faith. Jesus said that he came to serve, and he used foot washing as an example at the last supper he had with his friends. He also said that whatever we do for the least of our brothers and sisters is service to him.

I'm also in a time of preparation, as I prepare to be licensed as the vicar of Newbold with Dunston **on Wednesday 28th June at 7.30pm**. My prayer is that I will continually seek first to serve. This Holy Week I got to wash feet at the Maundy Thursday service, and I was reflecting with those at morning prayer how this is a very different to what Jesus did for the disciples in an environment that necessitated people to wash their feet when coming indoors. I wondered what would be a modern equivalent and thought that maybe cleaning the toilets would be closer!

The Diocese have recommended that I have 4 weeks off before my licensing, so I will be unavailable for the month of June. The churchwardens, Richard and Carol have already arranged cover for the services in June so you will be in good hands.

Some of you will have noticed that the Rectory is now up for sale. In the period of interregnum, the Diocese made the decision (ratified by PCC and other involved parties) to sell the Rectory and to buy a newbuild on the Skylarks Estate for the new vicar. This was influenced by the cost of heating the Rectory and the costs to make it more energy efficient, and also the wish to have a presence in a different part of the parish.

In May at our **APCM** (see page 11), we also get to reflect on the past year, and so I'd like to say my thanks here to everyone in the church community and in the wider community for all your support in a year where I was the "de facto" vicar.

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## **Anointing a King**

During the coronation service, the Archbishop of Canterbury anoints the King with oil, a practice which can be traced back to the coronation of King Dunstan in 973.

This custom has roots in the Old Testament, where oil was used to anoint the priests (Exodus 30.22-30) and later kings (1 Samuel 10.1).

Jesus himself quoted Isaiah at the start of his ministry saying, "The spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the broken-hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners; to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour."

The Chrism oil used for the anointing was consecrated in The Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem in March this year.

It will be contained within the Ampulla, made from gold and cast in the form of an eagle with outspread wings. The oil is poured through an aperture in the beak. The Ampulla was supplied for the coronation of King Charles II in 1661 by the Crown Jeweller, Robert Vyner, and is based on an earlier, smaller vessel, which in turn was based on a fourteenth-century legend in which the Virgin Mary appeared to St Thomas à Becket and presented him with a golden eagle and a vial of oil for anointing future Kings of England.



The silver-gilt Coronation Spoon is the oldest object in use at Coronations, having been first recorded in 1349 among St Edward's Regalia in Westminster Abbey, and is the only piece of Royal goldsmiths' work to survive from the

twelfth century, having possibly been supplied to King Henry II (1133-1189) or King Richard I (1157-1199). It was used to anoint King James I in 1603, and at every subsequent Coronation. In 1649, the Spoon was sold to the Yeoman of King Charles I's Wardrobe, who returned it for King Charles II's Coronation in 1661, when small seed pearls were added to the decoration of the handle.

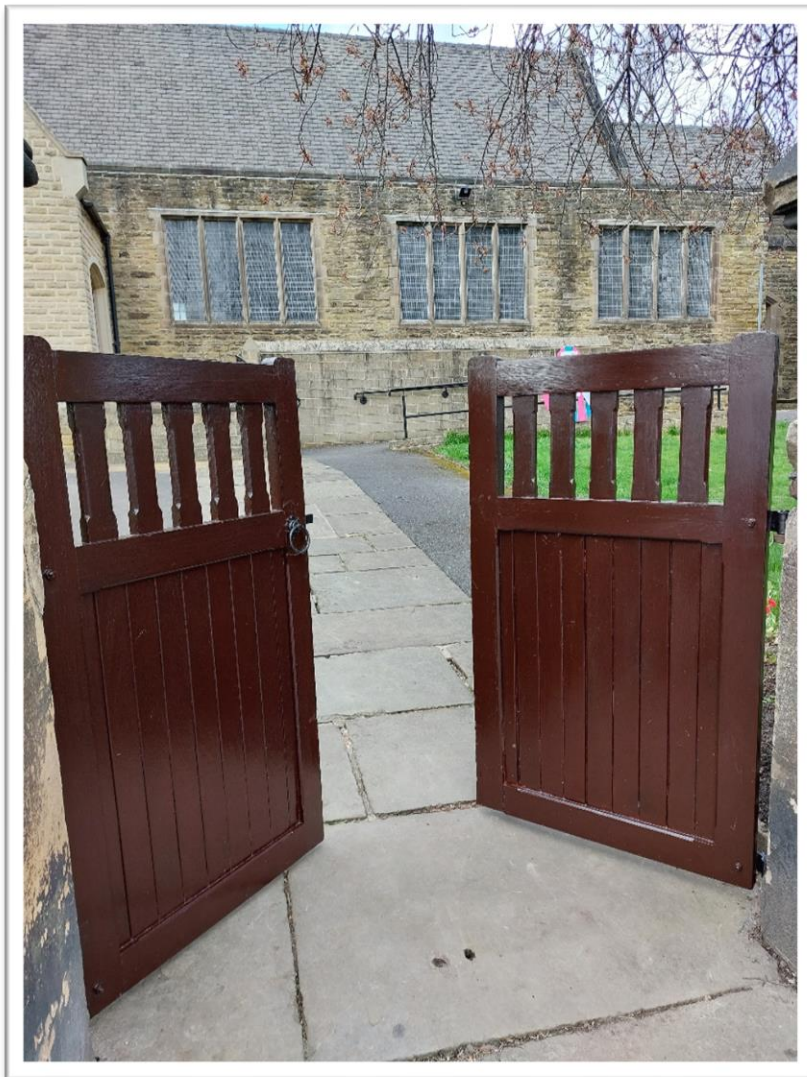

## Bishop of Derby writes ....



The Coronation of His Majesty the King and the Queen Consort is nearly upon us. Many of us will watch the Coronation on Saturday, 6th May gathered at home or at venues with a big screen.

I'll be watching at a screening at Derby Cathedral with several hundred others (all are welcome to come along). And, over the weekend, our churches will have services with special prayers and perhaps other celebratory events. Check out what is happening at [www.achurchnearyou.com](http://www.achurchnearyou.com).

The liturgy of the coronation is rich in ancient ritual and beautiful prayers. There will be 'sing along' familiar hymns and newly commissioned pieces of music to enjoy. At the heart of the Coronation is the anointing of the King with oil consecrated last month in Jerusalem, symbolising his vocation to serve the people of the United Kingdom and the other realms and territories. Part of the ceremony recognises the monarch's role as head of the Church of England, something that King Charles holds very dear and that guides his commitment to serve a nation and commonwealth that are wonderfully multi-ethnic and multi-faith.

**On Sunday**, we are invited to share the **Coronation Big Lunches** (with delicious food that no doubt will reflect our nation's vibrant cultural diversity). Some may remember the last Coronation, bringing together communities with a sense of pride in the new Queen. We will all recall last year's Platinum Jubilee celebrations, and across the nation people may again be drawing together with

loved ones to celebrate - perhaps enjoying a picnic with friends in the park, or with family over drink to toast the new King. It could also be an opportunity to include those sometimes left out, perhaps inviting an elderly neighbour or newcomers to the street, so they too feel welcome at the celebrations.

The King is determined to ensure the celebrations connect with the reality of our lives with themes of service and neighbourliness shaping all the planning. So, **Bank Holiday Monday (8th May)** is the **The Big Help Out** and a new website has been launched to sign up for volunteering opportunities: [www.thebighelpout.org.uk](http://www.thebighelpout.org.uk). Could you roll up your sleeves and volunteer locally with a small organisation in your neighbourhood or a more high-profile national charity? Whether you have an hour or the whole day to give, The Big Help Out encourages all of us to take an opportunity to join in and make a difference.

Later in the month the Church celebrates the festivals of **Ascension and Pentecost**, remembering Jesus' heavenly reign and the sending of the Holy Spirit. As we do each year, for the ten days from **May 18th – 28th, we commit ourselves to pray 'Thy Kingdom Come'**. We pray and work for our local communities to be transformed for good reflecting ever more Jesus' kingly values of love and peace and justice, and for friends and family to come to know and join in the life of His Kingdom, not just for a few hours over the Coronation Bank Holiday Weekend but all day, every day. # **Newbold Women's Group**

## ***From Wendy Drake – Committee Member***

The Women's Group welcomed speaker Marjorie Dunn to the April meeting, when she gave us a very informative, interesting, and humorous talk on Queen Mary's Dolls House.

Housed at Windsor Castle, it was a gift from the nation to Queen Mary, consort of King George V. It is the largest, most beautiful, and famous dolls house in the world, built between 1921 and 1924 by the leading architect, Sir Edwin Lutyens, and containing contributions from over 1500 of the finest artists, craftsmen, and manufacturers of the early 20th century, all built to a scale of 1:12. Each piece is unique and bears the name of the company who made the original full-size article, and all are working models. The house even includes electricity, running hot water and working lifts, a fully stocked wine cellar, and a garden created by Gertrude Jekyll, as well as garages containing well-known, and working makes of cars. No detail was forgotten. It was suggested that Prince Michael of Kent always admired the house as a child, but was never allowed to personally play with any of its numerous contents.

Following the appeal by Margaret F last month for towels, bedding etc., she was able to report that everything was being well received by the Ukrainian folk now living locally. Collections of clothing were now being requested by The Central Methodist Church in Saltergate.

A visit has been arranged to Boundary Mill in Catcliffe, Rotherham on 28 June, leaving at 10am and arriving back at about 4pm. There are still a number of seats available, so do please speak to one of the committee members if interested. Cost will be £9, or if the coach can be filled will be £7.

Our next meeting will be on **Wednesday 3 May at 7pm**, when we shall be having a talk by Sue Pacey, a midwife, beekeeper and novelist, on **'Bees, Books and Babies'**.

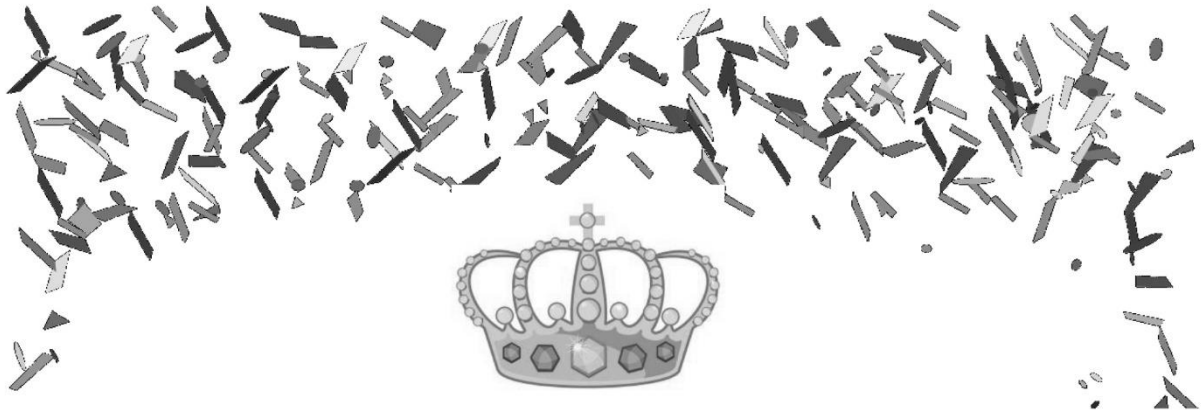

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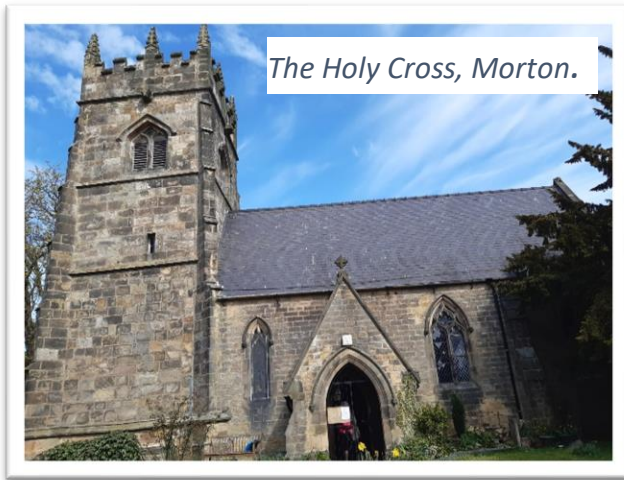
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# The Walking Group - Morton

Our walk started from the car park on Church Lane, opposite the Sitwell Arms and down Stretton Road with the church of The Holy Cross on our left. This church is Grade 2 listed and its congregation celebrated 1,000 years of worship in 2002. It was

largely rebuilt in 1850 but still has its medieval tower, which dates from c1350 and has six bells.

Morton lies 3 miles north of Alfreton. The manor of Morton was acquired by the Sitwells of Renishaw in 1749 and the estate disposed of in 1912.

Midland Rail opened a station at Doe Hill in 1862 and three years later George Stephenson's Clay Cross Company opened their first colliery in Morton and most of the houses now in the village were built to house colliery workers.

According to road signs entering Morton, the village is the geographical centre of England and a plaque, marking this point, was erected by the Parish Council in 1990's and can be seen on an oak tree opposite No. 69 Stretton Road.

We turned right onto Evershill Road and through a pleasant area of well-maintained bungalows and gardens, spotting a magnolia full of plump buds waiting to break out of their skins. We followed a tarmac lane with fields on each side which I was informed were used for horse racing in the past, much like the ones at Whittington Moor. Our journey took us over a bridge, the railway line below leading to Nottingham and then into Padley Wood where there was an abundance of bluebell leaves which will burst into flower and fragrance in a month's

time. In the distance we spotted Clay Cross church with Danesmoor village near to it.

We passed Padley Wood Solar Farm surrounded by a high wire fence and security cameras. We walked a plank bridge over a stream and by this time we were caked in mud, which, it turned out, we had to struggle through for the remainder of the walk.



We carried on and negotiated a different bridge over the same railway line and into another wooded area where patches of moss had enveloped tree boughs lying on the ground and had crept up many of the trees still standing.

Our walk continued

through Danesmoor Farm, the guard dogs barking loudly and aggressively, announcing our arrival, and over three water-logged fields to reach the road and a short walk on a solid tarmacked surface, which was a delight after plodding through such a lot of mud.

Our next walk on **Sunday 7th May** will be the day after the King's Coronation. We will meet, as usual, at the church gates at **12 noon** with a packed lunch and welcome anyone who wishes to join us.

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## **Churchyard bird watch**

We did our bird watch on Saturday April 1st. It was not wet but it was cool and cloudy. John, Wendy, Trish and I met at the front of the church. We walked around the side of the

church and were met by Hilary and Chris who were doing the coffee morning, they were carrying lots of goodies so we were all looking forward to eating some of them at the coffee morning when we finished.

We had a lovely walk around the church yard listening to the bird song as well as spotting as much as we could and identifying birds by their songs too. This certainly applied to the rooks and the crows who were not only visible but very vocal too, probably because they both had nests in the churchyard.

We spent a while at the Kendal Road end watching a blue tit pecking around the hole of a nest box. This is a common habit in blue tits and there are several theories as to why they do this. It may be to let their partners know they have found a potential nesting site. It could also be to test the wood to see if it will stand up to the rigours of the breeding season or it could just be a remnant of their behaviour when they excavated their own nests.

John did look into several of the nest boxes, but none showed signs of occupation. He and Wendy intend to clean out the nest boxes in the coming week when they are on their daily walk through the churchyard.

Birds seen this month were blackbird, blue tit, crow, collared dove, dunnock, goldcrest, goldfinch, great tit, herring gull, house sparrow, jackdaw, long tailed tit, magpie, nuthatch, robin, rook, song thrush and wood pigeon.

The next bird watch is scheduled for **May 6th** when we hope to spot some of our summer migrants.

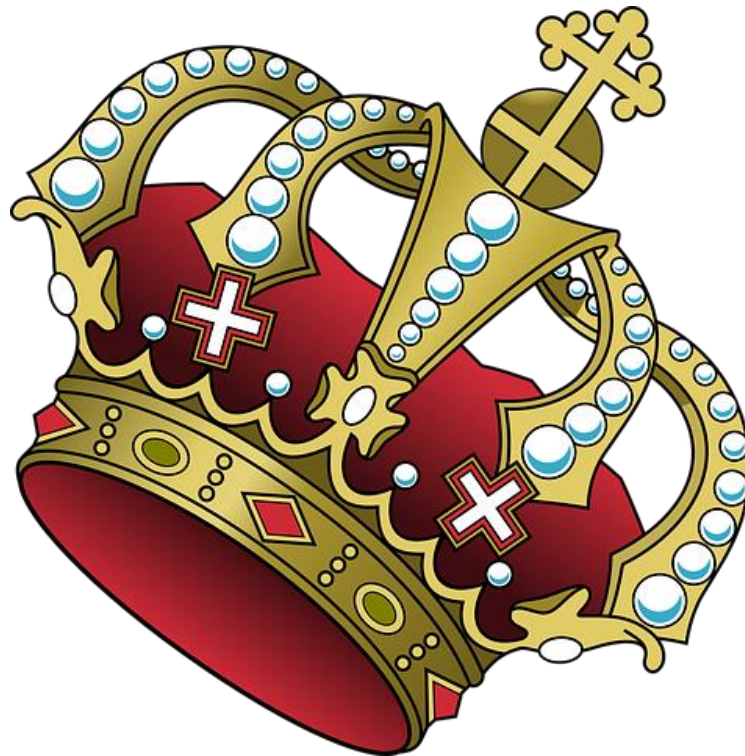
