Diocesan Monthly Message

July 2024



Archdeacon Karen writes...

A couple of years ago, 2021 I think, we decided to do 'No Mow May' for the first time ... and yes, I know it's not May – but it stretched into 'No Mow June' and 'No Mow July'! We ended up with so much grass of such great length that we actually built small stacks of it across the garden to let it dry out for a few days.

The last two years we have moderated the amount of grass we have left to grow across those 3 months (and even longer) by cutting patterns in it – this year it's like waves across the garden.

It still feels counter intuitive not to cut the grass - after all, we've always cut the grass even when we had a tiny patch in our back yard many years ago. And to my parent and grand-parents' generation 'cutting the grass' was almost ritualistic as they pursued the dream of a lawn. I cannot in all honesty call anything we have ever had in our garden a lawn, but I hadn't realised how ingrained the habit of regular grass-cutting was.

It was the next year, in 2022, that we noticed something rather wonderful, something that took us by surprise. In one of the unmown areas, we found a common orchid growing! It was beautiful and completely nothing to do with us. Changing the way we did things had allowed us to be surprised by the unexpected.

We remembered where the plant was and last year it grew and flowered again. This year the same thing has happened but there is now a second plant, 3 or 4 metres away from the first Wow! Abundance!

Change is always challenging, as it will be for a new government, and large-scale changes can be extremely difficult and painful. We knew that environmentally this particular small change was for the best even if it took some adapting to. The new thing, the orchids, that have happened are to me testament to the glory of creation and the whole experience, (which makes me smile every time I come up the drive), has spoken deeply to me metaphorically of the faithfulness of God in times of change and of his eternal capacity to surprise us with his creativity and abundance as we dare to do things differently.

Maybe this month, we can be on the lookout in the apparently small for those reminders of who God is and of what He is capable of when we decide to dare to change. And maybe, just maybe, that can grow our confidence in Him for the changes that we need in us, in church, and in society as a whole, if we are truly to see His kingdom come.

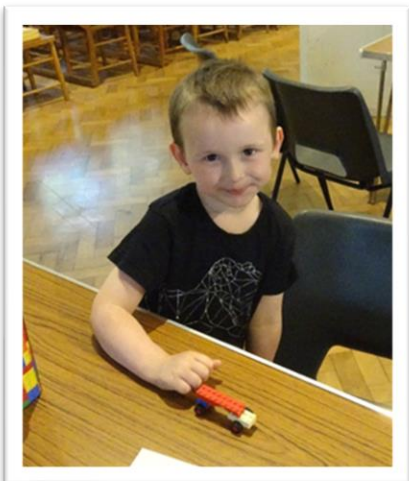

The Real Eternal Triangle



The real eternal triangle is the Holy Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. While it can be difficult for adults to understand the idea of God as three in one, it seems less of a mystery to children. Rhoda explained it brilliantly at our June Messy Church, using the illustrated looped triangle symbol and three paper chains; one of God as three in one and two chains coloured by the children. These were linked together to form a circle with three links.



Obviously, the crafts involved a lot of triangles and triplets. There was a lolly stick triangle, friendship bracelets made up of three coloured strands of wool, a paper shamrock, a pyramid and the chains of children. As well as that, there was always the Lego table.

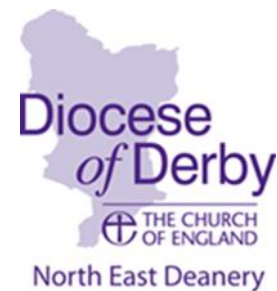
Important Note: Our next Messy Church will take place on the second **Sunday in July, the 14th**. The final of the European Championships will take place that evening. And

From Trish Law – Committee Member

For our meeting on 5th June, we were pleased to welcome back local historian Marjorie Dunn, who talked to us about **The Brontes**. Her approach was to understand why people are still drawn to them so much, which she felt was partly due to the hundreds of letters which they wrote and still exist, thus providing insight into their lives.

Patrick Bronte, surname originally Brunty, was born in Ireland to a poor family of ten children, but managed to acquire a good education, then he became a curate, but he also wrote poetry. He met and married Maria and they had six children, but Maria died young, and their Aunt Elizabeth came to live with the family. Patrick and Elizabeth educated the children at home, including writing, painting, music and French and they wrote their own imaginative stories in miniature books which still exist. After the death of three of the children, the remaining three girls Charlotte, Emily and Anne, who had all become governesses, pursued their writing and eventually became successful, although they used the names Currer, Ellis and Acton Bell to hide their female status.

The Hathersage connection with Charlotte is often mentioned, as she visited her friends there in 1845. Marjorie's view of the theory that North Lees Hall was used as the basis for

Thornfield in Jane Eyre is that it was an amalgam of three properties, including North Lees. The most convincing fact is the very rare 12 Apostles cabinet which was in this building and is



mentioned in the book.

There is NO meeting in July as the date for our outing was changed to 26th June, so our visit to Renishaw Gardens has already taken place.

There is NO meeting in August but on Saturday 3rd August the group is hosting the Community Coffee Morning in the Parish Room at 10am.

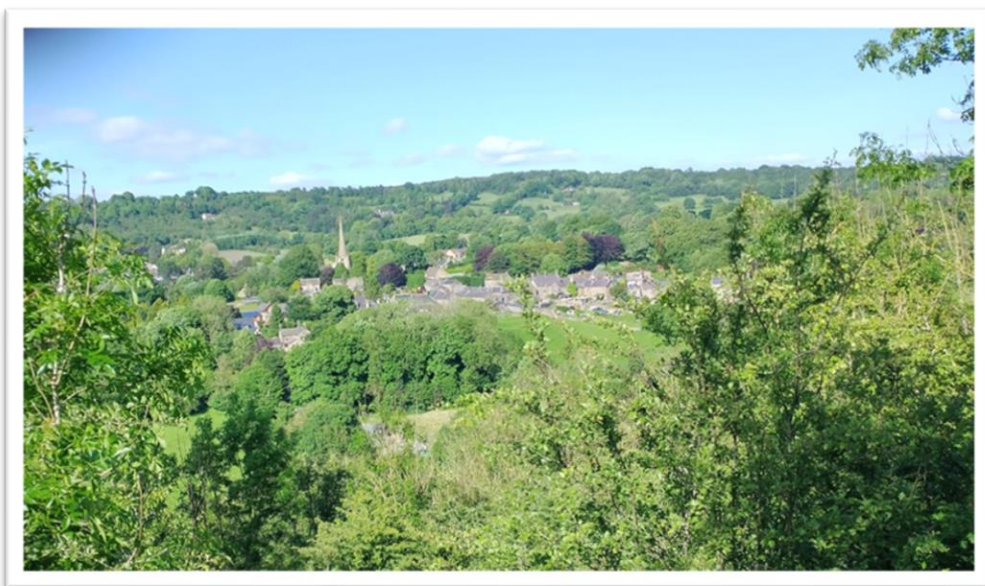

For our June late afternoon / evening walk the weather was kind to us, the sun was shining and the temperature ideal for our walk.

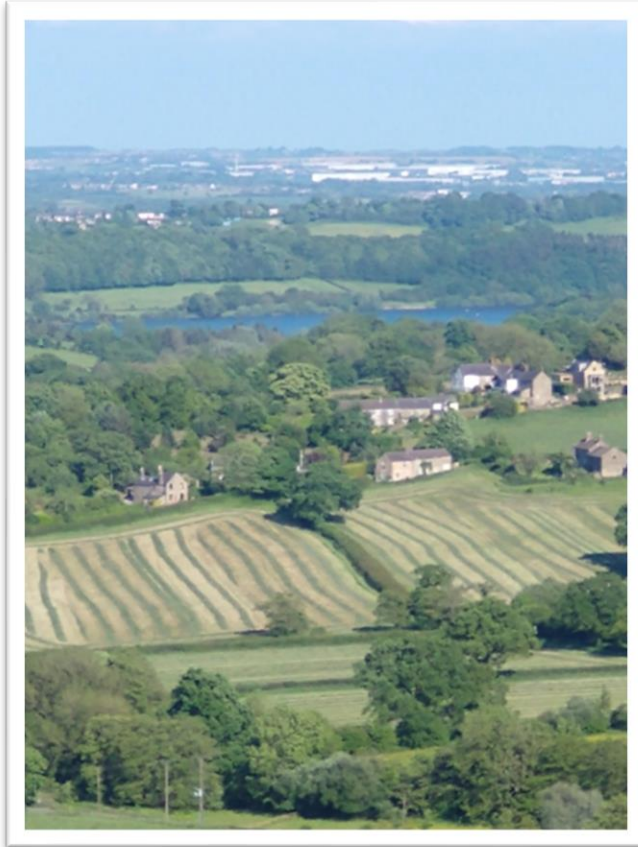
The five of us met outside church and decided on a circular walk from Ashover Church. Earlier in the week Bob and Evelyn had walked the route in rain with many of the paths running with water.

Once we had parked up in Ashover we walked past All Saints Church, built between 1350 and 1419 by Thomas Babington, the great-grandfather of the Anthony Babington, executed at Smithfield for the plot, on behalf of Mary, Queen of Scots, to murder Elizabeth I.

After walking along Butts Road we crossed the River Amber, a tributary of the River Derwent. Heading uphill we climbed steps through woodland. At the top we paused to admire the view of Ashover.



Crossing Gin Lane we entered Matlock Forest, continuing uphill through a stony area which appeared to be an old quarry. Over to our left we could see an old stone chimney. Here we paused to sit on rocks to eat our sandwiches and admire the views.



Following our break, we continued climbing up a steep slope before crossing a field full of barley. Shortly we reached Holestone Gate Road which we followed for half a mile. On our left, silage was being collected; it looked a good crop following the wet and warm spring.

Soon, at a bend, we took a footpath on our right. This entered the wooded

area called Bradley Hollow. Exiting, we crossed a field before joining Gin Lane again which we followed for a short while. Crossing further fields and passing Hate Wood on our right, we descended towards the River Amber, crossing on stepping stones.

Entering Ashover we took a narrow path at the back of some houses before joining Church Street and returning to our cars.

We agreed it had been a good walk to do; the clear evening giving some marvellous views despite the steep climbs.

If anyone wishes to join us, then meet us outside church at **4pm on Sunday 7th July.**

Churchyard Birdwatch

For one reason or another, none of the birdwatchers could make June 1st for the birdwatch in the churchyard as planned. That doesn't mean we have ignored the birds. In fact, it has been quite busy in the churchyard. On June 2nd I went up to the churchyard in the late afternoon in order to meet Peter and see if any birds needed ringing. The Walking Group was beginning to gather and as I approached, they thought I had come to join them. I quickly told them I was here for bird ringing and the appearance of Peter made that clear.

Unfortunately, we were too late to ring some of the birds. One box was totally empty with no sign of nesting, but we definitely had one nest fledge as there is a lady on Kendal Road who lives close to the nest box, and she was in her garden and had seen them. At least two of the other boxes had a sadder story to tell and there were dead chicks in them. There was one box with chicks alongside the path through the churchyard. There were two of them and they were very small. We could hear the parents protesting as we examined the chicks so that gave us reason to hope they would make it.



On Thursday 6th I did the birdwatch with Trish. Neither of us could make Saturday, so we chose a day when we were both free. It was fine and sunny, but quite chilly. The highlight of the morning was a **sparrow hawk** flying overhead. We didn't see too many birds, a total of 16. They were goldfinch, woodpigeon, crow, blackbird, house martin, starling, bluetit,

robin, jackdaw, swift, magpie, herring gull, house sparrow, sparrow hawk, long tailed tit, great tit.

Later that day I was meeting Peter again. He felt the blue tits, had they survived, would now be big enough to ring. Sadly, we weren't able to do so as there was only a dead chick in the nest. The other one had either been predated or removed



from the nest by the adults when it had died. As viewers of Springwatch will know, this year has not been a good one for bluetits. The wet weather has made life difficult for them.
