

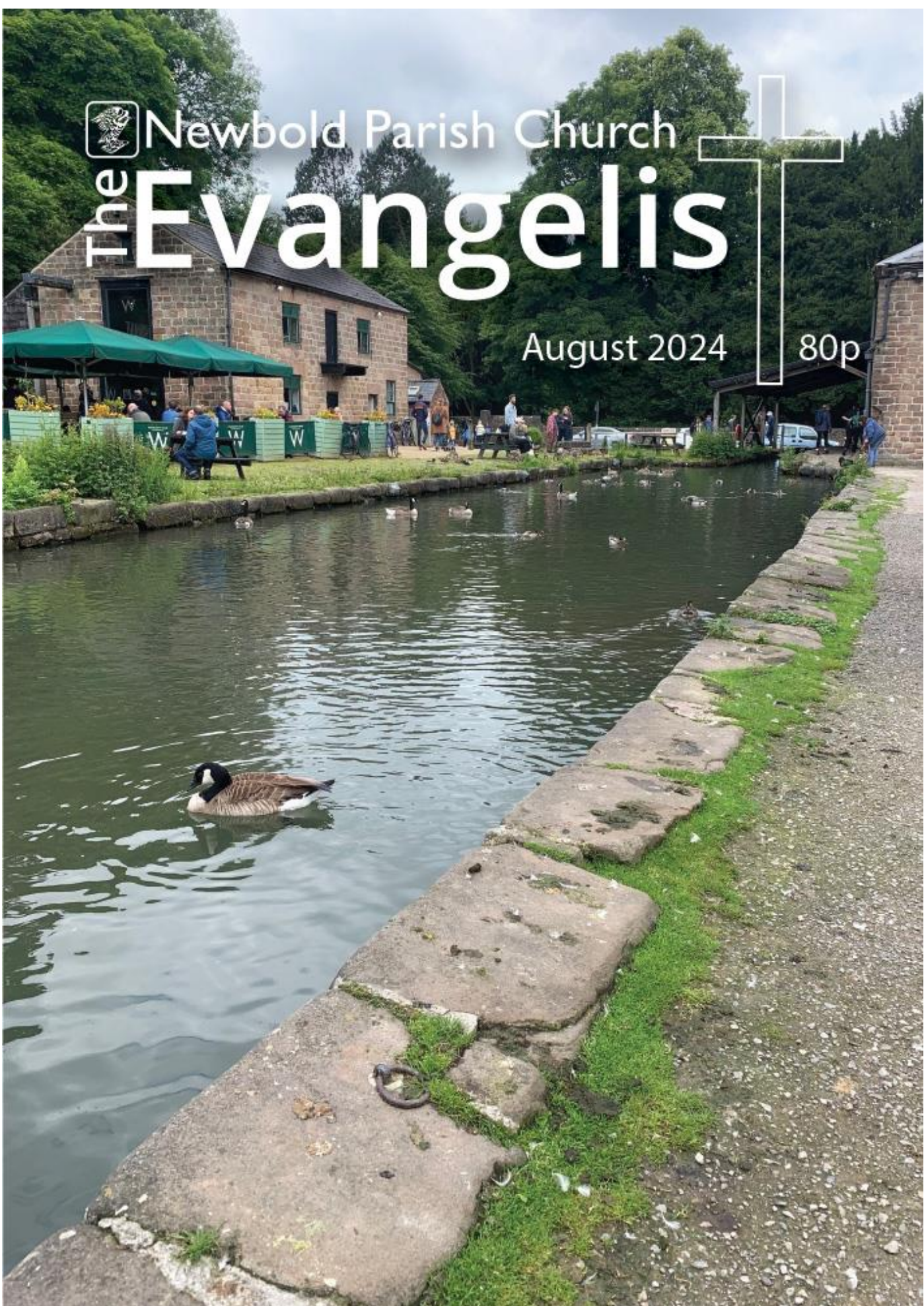

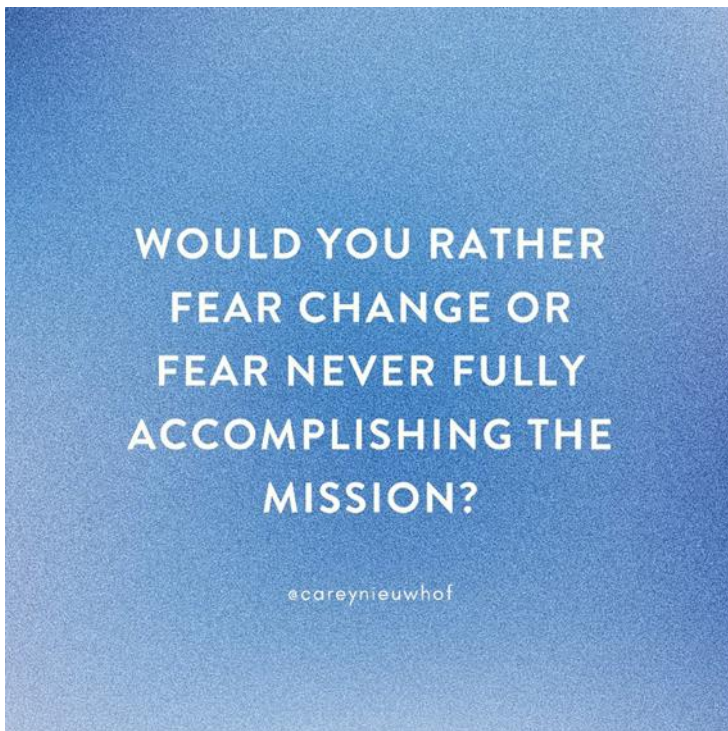

Change is inevitable. The pace of change in technology in the last few decades has been phenomenal, and it's interesting how quickly we adjust. Most of us now own a mobile phone, and, indeed, wonder how we got by without them.



There are changes afoot with “The Evangelist” in the next couple of months, as we welcome a new Editor on board, Elaine Lawrence (see page 14).

The COVID lockdown in March 2020 forced the magazine production into a new era, and, since then our Administrator, Sue Wheeler, has been producing the issue each month using Word. Now

she is handing the baton on, and we want to thank her for all she has done over the past 4 years. We also want to thank Emma for offering to take it over, and we wish her all the best, and look forward to see how it develops into the future.

The Building project has also moved forward since I last wrote about it. We are at the stage of appointing an architect, and of consulting widely to find out what people would like a modernised and refurbished church building to provide in terms of facilities, and also activities, church services, and other events.

The vision is crystallising, and it is hoped we will be able to:

- Re-roof the church, including insulation
- Provide new toilets
- Provide a proper kitchen
- Make the nave and aisles into a multi-purpose space for larger church and community events and activities.

One of the problems in envisaging ways to improve our buildings is that over time, we become too settled and can't imagine how anything different could work.

Carey Nieuwhof, a leadership blogger, wrote "It's easy to get into a headspace where you think you've mastered something because you had to work your way from the ground up. You know this better than anyone and you've been successful with it in the past. There's a grain of truth in that of course. Maybe a few grains. But what you miss is that clinging onto past success will ruin your future. You end up being the person still trying to sell CDs in the age of streaming. If you're holding onto the past, you won't have much of a future."

My prayer is that, working alongside a good architect, we will be able to renovate the church, link, and parish room, and increase its use, so that it is sustainable for many more decades to come, and that, as we pray in the Lord's prayer—God's Kingdom will come and God's will be done.

Can you believe we are now in the month of August? Where is this year going to and when are we going to have some more summer?!

Last month I said I would be explaining some items of clothing that are worn during services.

A **stole** is a liturgical vestment worn by various Christian denominations which is a long loose scarf made from a band of coloured cloth, usually silk, seven and a half to nine feet long and three to four inches wide. Priests and Bishops wear them around their necks and Deacons over the left shoulder.

An **Alb** (from the Latin *Albus* meaning white) is one of the liturgical vestments of Western Christianity.

It is a white garment coming down to the ankles and has a type of belt, sometimes of rope. Nowadays the Alb is a common vestment for all ministers both cleric and lay persons (acolytes).

A **chasuble** is a type of liturgical vestment worn by clergy during the celebration of the Eucharist primarily in Christian churches of Western tradition, such as Roman Catholic, Anglican and Lutheran.

During the last few weeks, we have welcomed a number of visitors, and a few have become regular attenders which is fantastic news.

Many of our groups take a break during August. A time to recharge the batteries, to think about what we are doing in the coming month.

The schools and preschool nurseries have broken up for the summer holidays. In September some children will be starting school for the first time whether it be preschool, or nursery. Some children are changing primary school going into Year 3, moving up to senior school or going to college, university or into the workplace. May we wish them all the best in whatever they do.

O Lord thank you for this brand-new month, to know and serve you more. We are excited for what lies ahead, this new beginning of a new month. Please bless us with good health, strength, and wisdom as we face the challenges of this blessed month. Amen

'Promptings' of a New Churchwarden

When I first saw the request for a churchwarden to replace Carol, in the weekly news sheet, I had no inclination to put my name forward. However, as the weeks moved on with still no offers, I felt I was getting a 'prompt from above.' So here I am, and learning the ropes from Richard who has been very helpful I have to add, and patient, and I am certainly beginning to learn a lot of what goes on 'behind the scenes.'

My Christian life only really started to take shape once our son and daughter had arrived, and after a move from London to Runcorn in Cheshire, where John had been offered work with ICI. Son, Chris, had joined the Cubs and later Jo, our daughter had joined the Brownies, and both were expected to attend a monthly Church Parade at our local Ecumenical Church to which parents too, were invited. That seems like many moons ago since they are both now in their late 40's.

My Mum, who lived in Hastings, had terminal cancer at the time, and my brother Terry had arranged for a Vicar friend of his to call and support her during her last days. She found much comfort from his visits until the end of her life. I then felt that if the church had helped her then I was interested in knowing and learning more. An early 'prompt' for me to join the local church in Runcorn?

Confirmation followed, and I recall very clearly that our leader on the course was our own URC Minister who asked for a volunteer to read the Bible passage at the service. All heads went down to avoid any eye contact, but I was 'prompted' to offer.

So began more involvement with church and I joined the 'Joyful Singing Group,' and became a member of the Pastoral Team. I was still working when another local Vicar, who was also a Hospital Chaplain, came to talk to the Pastoral Team about her role and the need for more volunteers to join the hospital team. I, (another prompt?) decided there and then that once I had finished working, I would like to get involved and I spent thirteen years fulfilling the role at the local hospital until the move away. I most definitely felt really privileged to get to experience a worthwhile, very satisfying, and enjoyable role.

I had the opportunity to meet up with a good number of patients who I had known but not seen for years and got to know more about many of the older folk who were longer stay patients. We held a weekly service in the hospital chapel, and I got quite proficient at manoeuvring wheelchairs into tight spaces when rounding up any patients who were capable and wishing to attend.

Moving to Chesterfield, and St John's, almost 5 years' ago, I believed that I might, at last, retire from any 'official' duties, but felt prompted yet

again to 'do my bit' still and joined the Pastoral Team and Newbold Women's Group. Having been an active member of the North Cheshire RSPB Group with John, we both joined the Chesterfield Group where I do now take a 'backseat.' Crown Green Bowls is another interest that we both have carried across. I did prefer playing socially but now have got roped into playing in league matches, sometimes well but not always, but I enjoy it.

I look forward to fulfilling my new role as Churchwarden as best I can so, please bear with me.

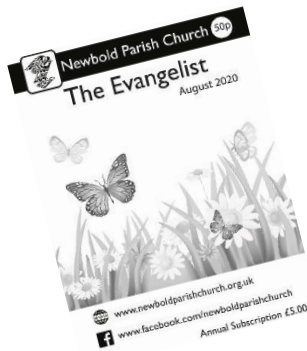
Paper copies of the new Church Directory have been circulated to those who appear in the directory.

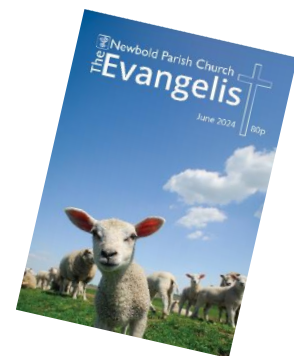

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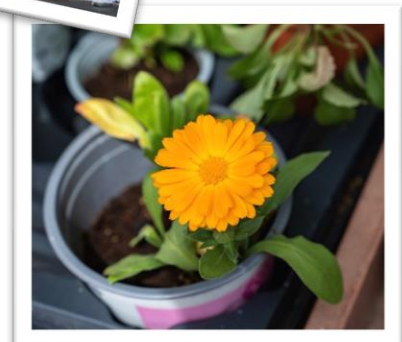
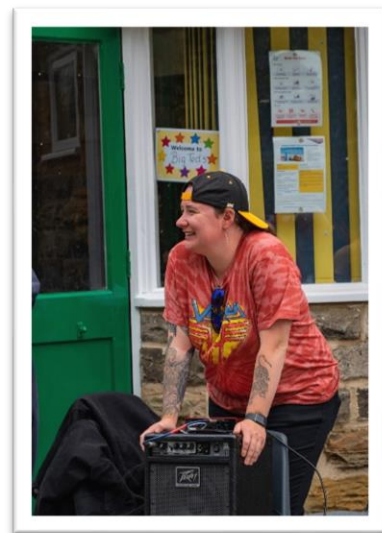




The Summer Fete 2024

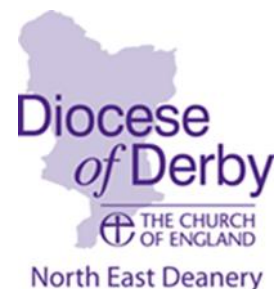
Our next meeting will take place on

The Walking Group – Scarcliffe

A robin greeted us as we strode towards the broad path leading to the Stockley trail on a tranquil summer's evening. Sunlight was filtering through the trees and as we moved into a field, we disturbed a pheasant that rose from the long grass with an angry squawk.

We walked past “Breaking the Mould”, an artwork that shows a seed breaking from a stone mould to represent new life emerging from industrial decline. This is one of 21 identical sculptures installed as “markers” for various regeneration sites across England and Wales.



We approached the lake of the Peter Fidler Nature Reserve, seeing only a handful of ducks and Canada geese. No sign of reed bunting or sedge warblers which are said to frequent the area all year round.

Peter Fidler was born in Bolsover in 1769 and died in Manitoba, Canada. He was a surveyor, map-maker, fur trader and explorer and had a long career in the Hudson Bay Company in Canada.

He married Mary (Methwewin) Mackagonne, a Cree woman and together they had 14 children.



We walked through barley fields and through healthy crops of wheat before arriving at Sutton Scarsdale Hall a Grade 1 listed Georgian ruined stately home, built between 1724 and 1729 for the 4th Earl of Scarsdale and now run by English Heritage. We

parked our bottoms on a bench to eat our sandwiches and enjoyed the wonderful views of Bolsover with the castle looming above green fields and the village of Palterton on the horizon. Continuing our walk, we strolled through fields of golden, autumn barley which, according to our leader, Bob, wasn't quite ready for harvesting. We climbed the first and last stile and through more fields to reach the cars and the end of a relaxing, quiet, 4.2 mile walk.

Churchyard Birdwatch

The morning started off cool, dry and cloudy and remained like that for most of the morning - although there were glimpses of blue sky from time to time. The ground was still very wet after all the heavy overnight and morning rain and the grass was quite long in places, especially at the back of the bungalows on Kendal Road.

Numerous Wood Pigeons dominated the sounds in the sky, and it was noticeable that there were no longer the harsh calls of the Corvids which had been heard in previous months. There was surprisingly little activity - mainly Blue Tits, but Herring Gulls were more plentiful. It was good to get views of Coal Tit which had not been seen recently.

We saw a total of 17 species; Blackbird, Blue Tit, Carrion Crow, Coal Tit, Dunnock, Goldcrest, Goldfinch, Great Tit, Herring Gull, House Martin, House Sparrow, Jackdaw, Magpie, Robin, Starling, Swift, Woodpigeon. Having thought that there was a lack of habitat I have now changed my mind when there was abundant growth in many parts of the churchyard.

On our tour we did observe Bob - the only member of the "Tidy Up" group doing his bit in trimming the holly hedge at the front of the church.
