

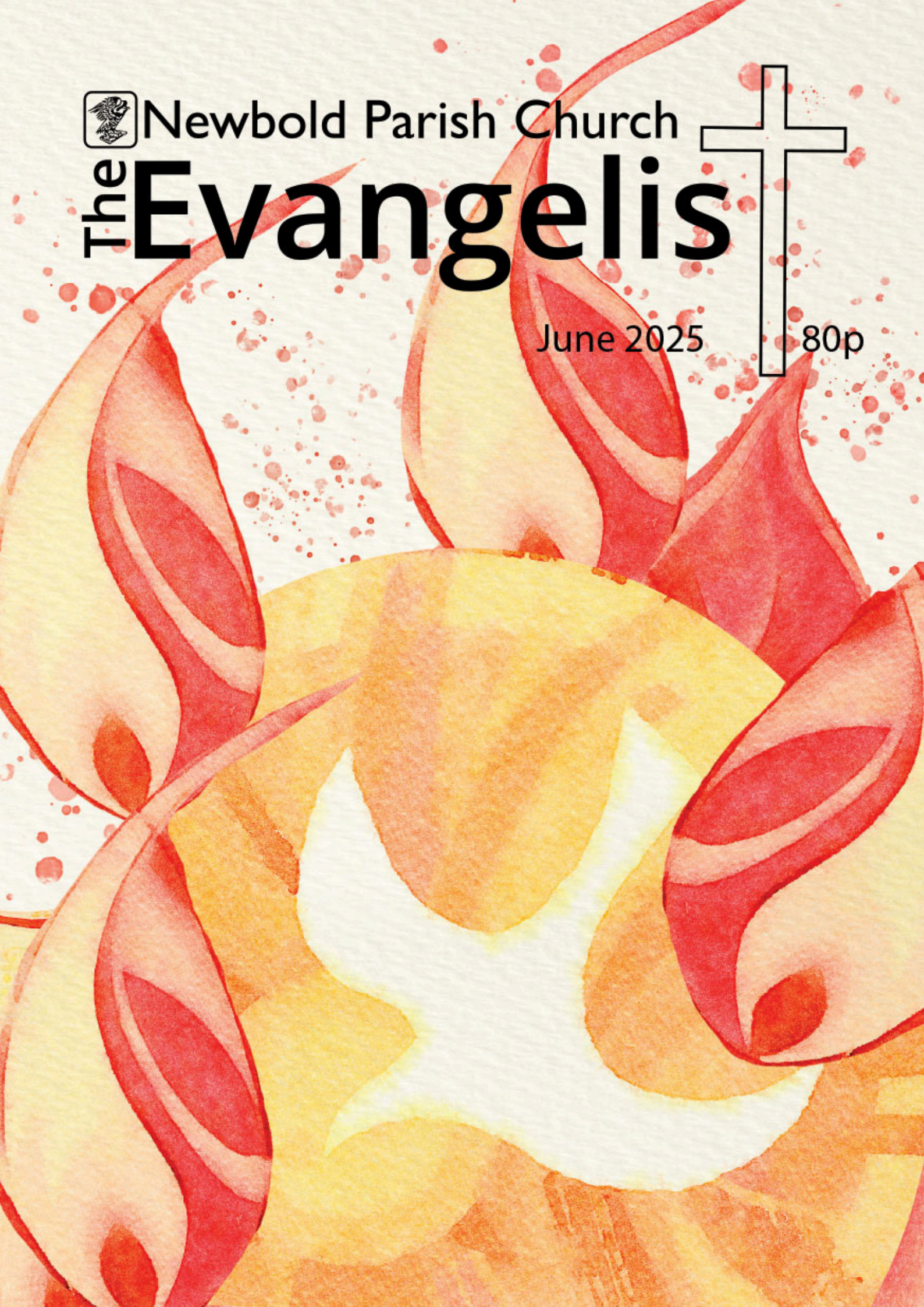

# From the Vicar

May 11 was Vocations Sunday, when the church celebrates those who have responded to God's call to serve, in whatever way that might be, and also to encourage us to wonder whether we are open to a calling.

In his talk to us during the Sunday service, our Lay Minister Chris talked about "imposter syndrome", and the times in his life when he has doubted his skills and talents for the place he was in. Many people do lack confidence in their abilities and downplay their skills. But, we can all think of examples in our lives of when we have "stepped up to the plate" and done something we might not have thought possible.

Also, the early church apostles taught that God's Spirit equips us for the roles that we are called to.

There are always lots of ways we can serve our church and our community. Even when we can no longer get to church because of illness or infirmity, praying for others, or phoning others to have a chat, is a hugely important service.

So, don't live with the regret of wondering what might or could have been if you'd had the courage, and if you want a chat with myself or Rev Malcolm about what you think you'd like to try, please do.

## **Match funding grant—Give-to-Go Green, Aug/Sept**

I am very excited to announce that we at Newbold have been selected to receive matched funding for our plans to insulate the church roof, which will double the impact of the donations that we receive.

Adding insulation as part of our re-roofing plans will reduce the cost of heating the church and enable us to make greater use of the building for different events.

**Please note that the match funding period will run for 6 weeks from the 17<sup>th</sup> August to 24<sup>th</sup> September this year.**

Any donations received in this period via a special collection code online or in church on the card reader machine will be doubled by the Church of England Net Zero Fund.

During this period, we are hoping to have the church open on Heritage Open Days with pictures and plans of what we are proposing to future proof our building and widen it's use in the community.

### **Thy Kingdom Come—29 May to 8 June**

Right at the beginning of the church, as Jesus was leaving the earth in the form that he'd been seen after the resurrection (The Ascension), he instructed his followers to pray and to wait for the Holy Spirit to come (Pentecost). This ended up being a period of 10 days, and there is a tradition in the church of praying intentionally during this period.

This year, we will be following a prayer journal that has a reflection each day on a sentence from the Lord's prayer (the "our Father"), which is the most widely known prayer and the one that Jesus taught his followers to pray.

## Dean Peter writes...

This year sees the 10th anniversary of Thy Kingdom Come, a prayer movement launched by the archbishops of Canterbury and York 10 years ago. Since its launch, Christians in 172 countries now participate and more than 85 denominations are involved. Thy Kingdom Come is truly global in its reach!



Thy Kingdom Comes focuses on the 10 days between Ascension Day and our celebration of Pentecost. Think back to the story of the disciples after Easter, waiting patiently in Jerusalem, full of expectation and anticipation, for the gift of the Spirit which Jesus had promised. If they were honest, it was all a bit frightening as they didn't quite know what the gift would involve. They may not have realised what the impact of the Spirit would be – for them all it would be a costly gift involving the giving of their own lives in witness to the risen Jesus - yet they waited in obedience to Jesus' instructions.

This year the focus is on the words of the Lord's Prayer, the prayer that Jesus taught his disciples to pray and which we pray in every act of Anglican public worship. The published materials say: 'the prayer Jesus taught us transcends the ages, uniting people across different denominations, generations, and nations. We believe that now, more than ever, we need to pray Thy Kingdom Come over our homes, communities, nations, and our world.'

The resources include reflections on the Lord's Prayer from a range of different voices from across the world to help us experience something new in a prayer that many of us are familiar with.

Thy Kingdom Come has travelled a long way in 10 years. Let's engage with it this year and become part of the story with global Christians. Let's enter the hope and expectation that the first disciples experienced in those days before the first Pentecost in Jerusalem. Let's create an opportunity every day in the 10 days between the Ascension of Jesus and the gift of the Holy Spirit, to notice where God is active in the world, in the church and in our own lives, and to commit ourselves to cooperate with God's work.

Why not visit [thykingdomcom.global](http://thykingdomcom.global) and see how you can get involved in your parish? There are resources to help the Church pray and especially there is an encouragement to pray for individuals close to us. We are encouraged to pray for five people each that we with them may know the gift of God's Spirit in their daily lives.

On Friday, 30 May, from 7pm to 10pm, Derby Cathedral is holding a prayer vigil for Thy Kingdom Come to which all are invited. Why not hold a vigil in your parish church and open your own parish community to the growing involvement in Thy Kingdom Come?

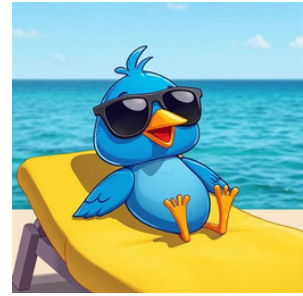

# CHURCHYARD BIRDWATCH

On the Tuesday before we did the birdwatch, I met Peter my bird ringer friend to see if any of the nest boxes were being used this year. I'm pleased to say that at present two of them are being used by bluetits. One contains eight eggs and the other six so we are hopeful for being able to ring chicks later in the year. We were quite excited to discover one parent bird was ringed and a note was taken of the number. Peter tells me that these birds don't go far so it is more than likely this bird was hatched in one of our nest boxes. As ringers keep a note of the numbers on the rings they've used Peter was going to check on it but disappointingly he hasn't got back to me yet.

On Saturday morning John, Wendy and I met outside church. It was colder than it had been on previous days, the wind had a cold edge to it, we felt cold unless we were stood in a patch of sunshine.

The church yard had been mown since I'd been there on Tuesday and looked very smart. As most of the birds were either nesting or incubating eggs we didn't get any good long views but we still managed to identify sixteen species.

We saw blackbird, blackcap, blue tit, crow, chaffinch, coal tit, feral pigeon, herring gull, jackdaw, magpie, nuthatch, robin, rook, swift, wood pigeon and wren. We also saw speckled wood butterflies and a couple of squirrels.

Our next meeting is on Saturday June 7th when we hope the house martins that had been seen earlier in the week put in an appearance!

Our May meeting was much anticipated by many of us as the speaker was Emma Richards of Age UK giving us a talk entitled "Live Stronger For Longer" all about the things we can do to prevent slips, trips and falls.

18 of our members were present and we had 7 apologies. Emma started her talk with an amazing statistic that in Derbyshire alone it is estimated that falls cost the N.H.S. £49,000,000 per annum.

Emma then invited the members to give examples of things we should be aware of to minimise the risk of trips and falls. Many members were able to provide examples of these dangers, with some speaking from experience.

Members were then shown six simple but highly effective exercises, working with a chair, both standing and sitting, that would improve our balance and strength. As we followed Emma's instruction some members found these simple exercises somewhat challenging, but vowed to continue to practice at home.

Finally Emma supplied us with the literature needed for us to work at home, and we all agreed her encouraging talk had given us a lot to think about, and was much appreciated.

The final part of our Meeting was an attempt to get members' opinions re. a visit to the Denby Visitor Centre, or Thornbridge Hall and gardens. With some members absent and the voting less than enthusiastic it was decided the Committee would give more thought to some other possibilities.

Our next Womens' Group meeting will take place on Wednesday 4th June when our Speaker will be Kevin Morley, with a talk entitled "Saltergate Children's Home in Ethiopia." Hope to see you there.

*Acts 12.1-11, 2 Timothy 4.6-8,17,18, Matthew 16.13-19*

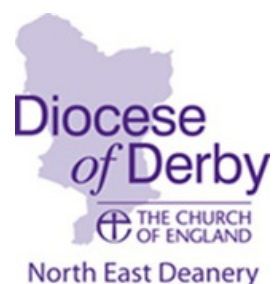

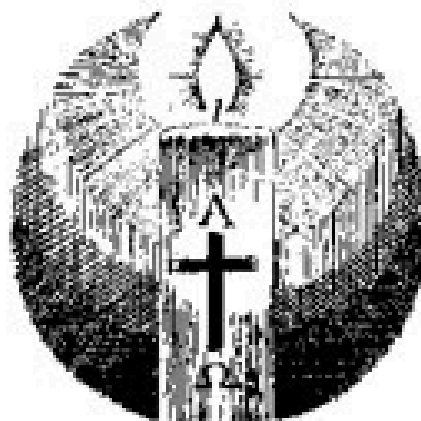

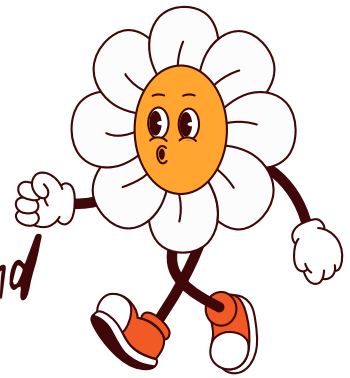

# Walking Group

## Ashford-in-the-Water, Bakewell and The Monsal Trail

We were joined on this walk by Emily, Julie's niece and Maisie, a delightful corgi-cross with a particularly wobbly bottom.

We parked near Ashford church and at 4.30pm began our walk, passing The Ashford Arms and noticing a lovely display of wisteria hanging over the porch of a stone cottage, before crossing the A6020. We walked over a bridge which crossed the river Wye and saw more wisteria as we left the main road and moved into a grassy field where a young family were playing football. With the river on our left we were delighted to see two pairs of Canada Geese with tiny goslings (geeslings, as one of our party described them). One pair had 5, the other had 4 chicks.

On a narrow path now bordered by clusters of forget-me-nots, we spotted two swans near to a weir, everywhere being so tranquil, it was calming to be walking in the evening air accompanied by the occasional



bird song. The grassy banks were covered in buttercups and dandelion clocks and rising above the weir were many trees of different colours, one being a cedar tree, spreading its flat branches out to the sides.



We arrived on the outskirts of Bakewell, through a squeeze stile and onto a main road, past Aldi. There were many displays of deep purple lilac growing in the gardens as we walked past Lumford Mill Offices and its tall chimney.

Opposite Lumford Cottages was a beautiful riverside area with mowed grass leading down to the river.

We stopped at number 2 Lumford House as we saw a mother duck with her 10 ducklings just inside the garden gate. The owners of the house were standing in their porch taking photos. A sign near the house said “Please keep your dog on a lead. Thank you from the ducklings”. A picture of ducklings had been added for extra effect.

With the river on our right, we walked into a field known as Win Meadow and were attracted by the calls of a duck and noticed she had one duckling with her on the water. The others were probably hidden in the banking. We arrived at Bakewell Bridge and turned left to go up to the station. In a field in the near distance, Steve pointed out half a dozen alpacas/llamas.

At the ‘Old Weigh Bridge’, a small, stone building with a yellow window, we made our way onto the Monsal Trail, bordered all the way along with more forget-me-nots, bluebells, honeysuckle and in one area a patch of garlic. A man passed us, dragging a small trailer with three big logs in it.



Arriving at a bench, we sat to eat our snacks then continued down the trail feeling the weather had turned from calm and mild, to a strong, cold wind. After a long, long stroll, ( you can probably guess that I was getting tired), we eventually turned off onto a tarmacked road and passed Thornbridge Estate. Steve pointed out an industrial building where Peak Ales are brewed.

As we walked the path beside a field of cows with young calves, the mother cows noticed Maisie and all anxiously walked purposely toward their curious offspring who had started to walk to the gate near to us.

We crossed the main road and up some stone steps, the cold wind dropped and we had wonderful views around us before we thankfully strode downhill towards Ashford, the church and the cars. Incidentally, Maisie was still full of energy; five and a half miles wasn't long enough for her.

Thank you to Steve for leading a walk which turned out to have a number of delightful moments of nature and wildlife.

## **NEW DEACON**

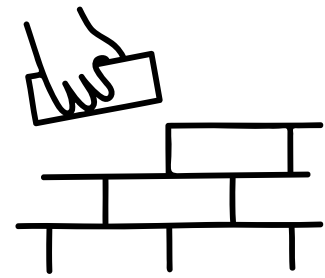
Our new Deacon, Rebecca Landers, is to be ordained at Derby Cathedral on Sunday 29 June at 10:45am by Bishop Malcolm.
