As I write, we are 10 days into our matched funding campaign to raise the money to insulate our church roof (see the flyer insert), and I am amazed that we have already reached 60% of our total. Please consider if you might be

My induction and installation

On Saturday 23 August there was a formal service to mark the legal move from my role as Priest-in-Charge to that of Vicar.

Our patron, Canon Patrick Coleman presented me to the Bishop, The Right Reverend Libby Lane, who then asked if I would pledge myself to the service of God in the benefice of Newbold with Dunston, to which my reply was 'with the help of God, I will'. Bishop Libby then prayed that God would give me the grace to fulfil my ministry in faith, hope and love.



I then knelt before the Bishop and she read the Deed of Institution in ancient flowery language, with me holding the seal.

After this, Bishop Libby invited the Archdeacon, Karen Hamblin, to induct me, led by the Churchwardens, Richard and Wendy. This required we walk to the church door to symbolically give me possession of the church, and also to sit me in my stall as Vicar.

I can now say I have been instituted, inducted and installed! Apart from these legal essentials, during the service we celebrated our church community together, including our Messy Church and our Building Project. The Scripture I chose was of the parable of the mustard seed growing into a large shady shrub, which Jesus told to illustrate God's Kingdom growing from small things. My prayer is that our church community will grow to become like the mature trees in our churchyard, providing shade and habitat, filtering pollutants, and enhancing wellbeing for all. Thank you to everyone who made the service so special.

Bishop Malcolm writes...

‘When through the woods and forest glades I wander...

September, October – what a glorious time for trees! - transient, dancing, swaying in the equinoctial gales, their leaves a kaleidoscope of changing colours, some fading, some ever deeper red or gold, eventually and inevitably floating to and fro down to the ground.



Even now I like to kick through piles of leaves in the garden or on the footpath. Each leaf is a unique work of art telling its tale of life and growth and beauty and decay, finding its way to mulch down for the winter, ready to energise future springs.

I love that verse from Revelation 22:2 reminding us of ‘the tree of life’ whose leaves ‘were for the healing of the nations.’ In Jesus we know the faithfulness of God, and find hope in every season of the year.

This month Bishop Libby’s Harvest Appeal focuses on ‘Trees for Peace – Burundi’. We are working along with the diocese of Bujumbura, helping them plant trees, as we did in 2023, but this time with a fresh emphasis on peacebuilding among people living on the hills around their city.

The work we helped with in 2023 has been very effective in stabilising the slopes against mudslide risk, and has enabled self help groups amongst women and young people.

Setting up businesses to grow and sell and plant seedlings has been transformative for those involved – but the church has

identified further potential benefits that can spring from this working together in partnership: peacebuilding and community cohesion.

These hills are home to families divided by ethnic and political loyalties. In living memory and more recently in times of elections these divisions have been exploited by groups eager to stir up conflict, and prone to exciting violence. By bringing people together across the divides to grow seedlings, to form self help groups, and to plant young saplings, the church is learning how to help break down barriers and build strong and resilient relationships for the future.

In this new project, which the Diocese of Bujumbura have named 'Integrated Environmental Restoration and Community Peacebuilding' alongside the tree planting there will be a range of activities including 'intergenerational dialogue groups', 'Memory and Hope trauma sharing workshops' and two new 'Youth Peace Brigades'.

The focus is on helping local people of all ages work together come to terms with their divided past and look to an economically productive future – this makes young and old less likely to be drawn into political or ethnic conflict, as with an income and something worth working for there is more to lose.

I thank God for the vision of the Diocese of Bujumbura in supporting parish ministry in these hills in such a down to earth and transformative way. It is a privilege for us to be involved. Following Jesus brings people together for good.

There are pictures of these slopes torn apart by ravines created by climate change induced flooding and mudslides, physically dividing communities, literally tearing the landscape apart. Worse still are the human divisions caused by traumas from previous conflict, exacerbated by extreme poverty. This integrated programme will bring healing for past hurts and unite both land and people in hope for a better, more peaceful future.

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CHURCHYARD BIRDWATCH

The birdwatch for July did not take place until the 21st for a variety of reasons. Our usual Saturday clashed with the church fete, and other commitments meant this was the first free morning Trish and I had.

When I arrived at the church it was very quiet. Usually when the first one there is waiting for the others you can see birds on the roofs of the flats and houses on St John's Road, or in the trees opposite the church, or in front of the church, but today there was nothing bar a lone woodpigeon.

After a little time, Trish was there and we looked again and saw a few birds on the roof of the flats and one on the aerial of one of the houses.

We set off on our usual route around the churchyard and slowly began to see a few more birds. At the back of the old rectory in the trees there we found a few. We knew they were around as we could hear them but catching sight of them was a different matter.

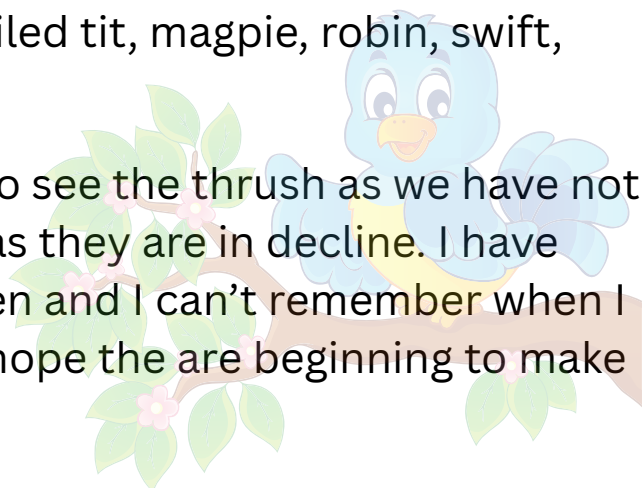
We were rewarded when we went past the houses on Dunston Lane that back onto the churchyard, as in one of the conifers we had a really good view of a goldcrest and then another one landed fairly close to it, so we had two to look at.

By then the birds had really woken up and we saw nineteen species during our trip around the churchyard; they were blackbird, bluetit, coal tit, collared dove, crow, dunnock, feral pigeon, goldcrest, great tit, herring gull, jackdaw, house

martin, house sparrow, long tailed tit, magpie, robin, swift, song thrush and woodpigeon.

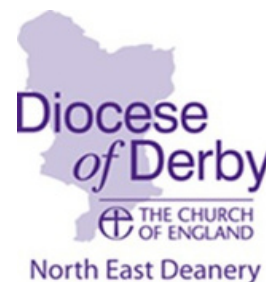
We were particularly pleased to see the thrush as we have not seen one for such a long time as they are in decline. I have also seen one in my back garden and I can't remember when I saw the last one. We can only hope they are beginning to make a comeback.

It was with that happy thought that we finished the birdwatch and began our walk back home.

‘YOU SHOOK MY HAND’

In the early 1960s, after my Uncle and Aunt moved moved to Kent, I visited them many times. I often met their friends, the Rose family who lived next door to the village church in Bridge. Indeed I stayed with Bill and his wife Joyce for the weekend of my cousin’s wedding. The recent 80th anniversary of VJ Day reminded me of the remarkable story of Bill Rose which I only learned of many years later when my cousin lent me the book of his wartime memories. This account is copied directly from his son’s website.

‘Bill Rose, a sergeant in the Royal Air Force, was taken prisoner in Java in 1942 and transported to the Japanese mainland by ship in a horrific journey lasting 31 days. He worked in 2 camps, Mitsushima, in the central Highlands where he worked on the construction of a dam, and Kanose, where he worked at the carbide furnaces.

Bill kept a unique day to day diary of his experiences. He had to be careful because of the snap inspections taken by the guards, five of whom were executed after the war tribunals at Yokohama. Bill found strength to cope with the conditions because of his Christian faith and comfort of prayer and determination to return home to his wife and son. He was mentioned in dispatches and awarded The Oak Leaf for his leadership and encouragement whilst a P.O.W.’



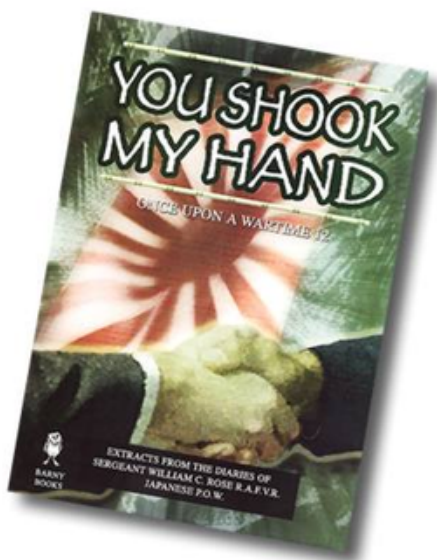
Mr William Rose (3rd from Left) and his family.

After arriving back home, Bill got on with his life, welcomed a second son, and buried his memories until his son brought home a Japanese girl friend, Bill's future daughter-in-law. On returning to Japan she went in search of the site of the carbide furnaces where she found a school, which Bill was invited to visit. He overcame his initial reluctance and was warmly received. The head boy gave a speech and said it was up to his generation to make sure that these things could never happen again. This was the first of many visits and Bill became deeply engaged in work for reconciliation including an annual service of reconciliation in Canterbury Cathedral.

Bill died in 2010 at the age of 98. The memorial service was attended by representatives of the Japanese Embassy, one of whom gave an address. His story, including extracts from his diary was published under the title 'You shook my Hand'. The first few chapters are a very difficult read, but the ultimate message is one of reconciliation and a determination to work for peace.

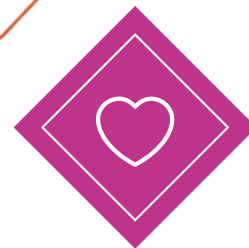

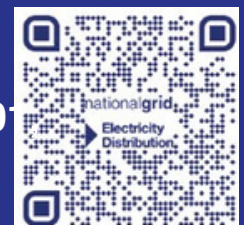

MICRO- CHIPPING?



A microchip is a tiny device — about the size of a grain of rice — that helps reunite lost pets with their owners. It's a safe, simple, and permanent form of identification.

Collars can fall off. Tags can fade. But a microchip is always there, giving your pet the best chance of being safely returned home if they go missing.



1. IMPLANTATION

A vet inserts a tiny chip under your pet's skin - quick, simple, no anaesthetic needed.



2. INITIAL SCAN

We scan the chip to confirm it's active and properly placed.



3. REGISTRATION

Your contact info is linked to the chip in a secure database



4. CONFIRMATION

You'll receive a registration email or letter - keep your info updated!



5. REUNITED IF LOST

If your pet is found, their chip is scanned and you'll be contacted!

It's required by law in dogs over 8 weeks old in the UK. Cats must now be microchipped by 20 weeks old (as of 2024). Ask our team about microchipping today - a few seconds could make a lifetime of difference.

Monyash to Lathkill Dale

On leaving the car park we were pleased to see four alpacas/lamas sharing a field with ten rooks before our leader Bob, indicated we should turn right towards Sheldon. Our way took us onto a grassy path boarded by nettles and purple thistles with green fields all around us. Steve stopped to stroke a honey-coloured horse which was busily chewing but we didn't disturb the chestnut one and the white one nearby.

A gusty wind started to blow and clouds threatened rain as a German Shepherd barked a warning and we entered an overgrown path with rose bay willow herb reaching up to our chins. We crossed a road onto another very wide, grassy, path and the entrance to Lathkill Dale and



then onto a pebble path shaded by hawthorn with various wildflowers – harebells, sedum, clover and blue geranium growing below. By 5.30pm we were deep in the valley surrounded by piles of limestone rocks and having to be careful as we negotiated our way around them but it didn't rain and all was quiet and calm.

The walk opened up into a wide area with lots of thistles and small yellow flowers on spikes which we couldn't identify. Bob led us to a large slab of limestone which was ideal for sitting

on to eat our snacks and soon we were off again to walk over a wooden bridge, no water below, and saw what was above us – uneven steps of smooth rock rising steeply to the sky.

With much puffing and the occasional prod from Steve's walking pole, we emerged on a flat surface to see a field of shorn sheep, one with a beautiful pair of curved horns.



As we approached One Ash Grange, we passed a grotto with statues of Mary, Joseph and the baby Jesus and further on, a long line of unused pig sties. Outside the barn was a sign advertising ice creams for sale and inside Steve found a freezer full of ice creams and an honesty box. We saw chickens in a small hen hut and on our left, in a barn, four cows happily chewing the hay.
