

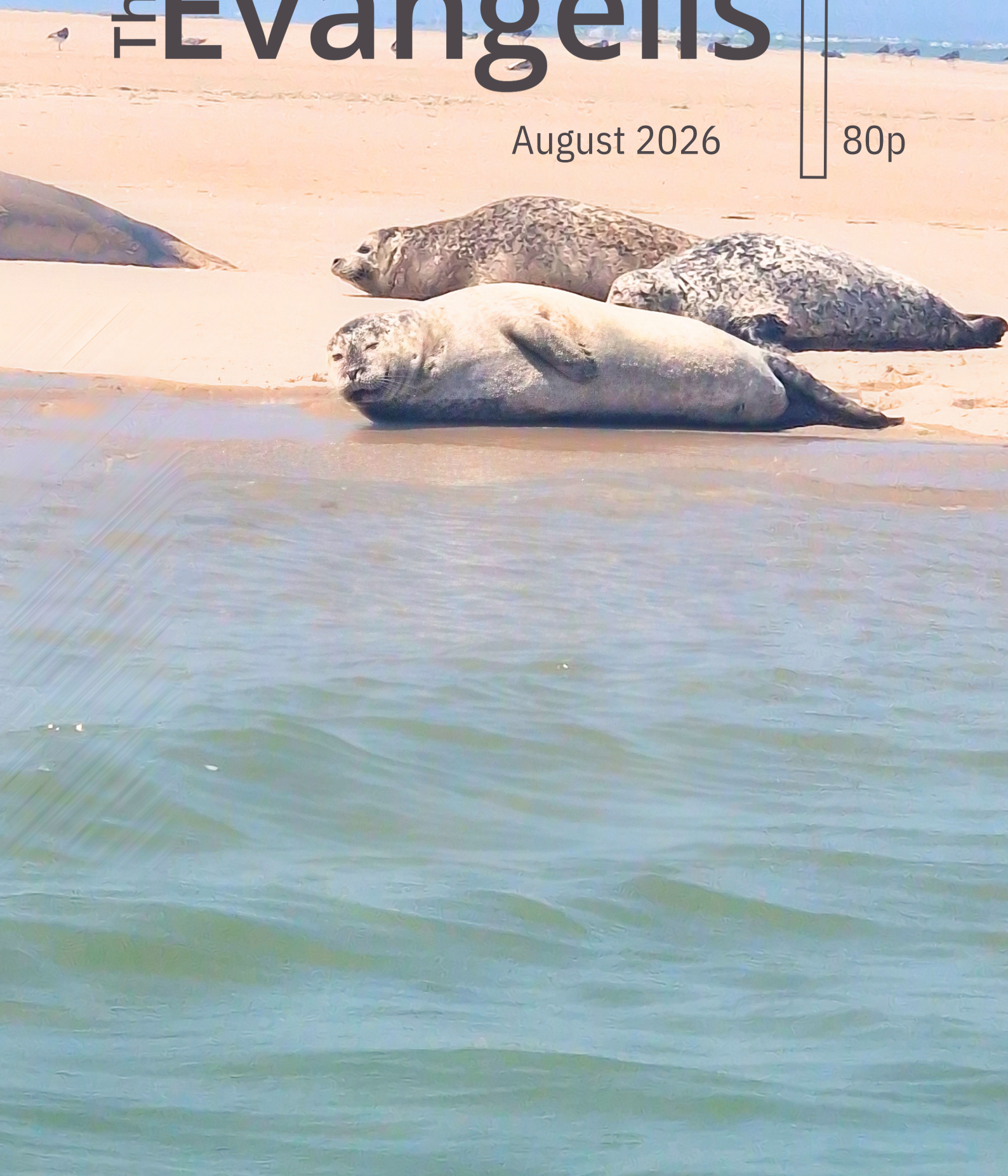

From the Vicar

August is a month rich with themes of summers warmth, transition and reflection. and can be inspired by a variety of poems. Below is one I have created.

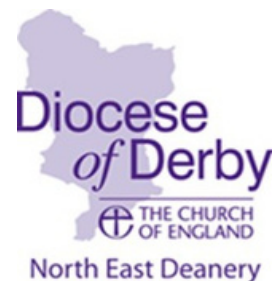
August is a time we try to get away;

Bishop Jackie writes...

Walking the Camino

**‘Blessed are those whose strength is in you; whose hearts are set on pilgrimage’
Ps 84:5**



Towards the end of May, just a few weeks after starting as Acting Bishop of Derby, I spent a week on pilgrimage. My heart had been set on walking the Camino do Santiago (‘The Way of St James’) for many years – and retirement offered the opportunity.

I wanted to make space for reflection on the pilgrimage of life. I hoped to connect with God and my Christian heritage, seeking wisdom and spiritual insight. And I wanted to walk those ancient paths in the company of fellow pilgrims. It is a matter of God’s sense of humour that as I embarked on my travels, I found myself called into ministry in the Diocese of Derby.

This is how life is as people of faith. We trust our ways to God and trust God’s timing too. In the end, it was the perfect time to reflect on being back in Derby, on God’s providence in the twists and turns of the journey of life.

On the sixth day, our last day of walking, our guide gave clear instructions – though we had walked at our own pace up until now, for the very last section of the day, the two miles into Santiago de Compostela, we would walk together. Our group had bonded, with deep conversations at times, and

companionable silence at others. To arrive together, at our destination, was a moment of great joy, and tears – we had done it. We had come to the holy place. That evening many of us attended the Pilgrims' Mass in the Cathedral – people of all nations and many languages, united in our worship and gratitude.

A prayer at the end of the Mass was said in English: 'As you kept them safe on their Camino way, may you keep them safe on their journey home; may they live the gospel of Jesus as their Camino of life continues.'

As we journey together in the diocese for this season, may we, as God's pilgrim people, live the gospel of Jesus.

With gratitude for our companionship and with prayers and blessings for the journey we share.

We pray that God might bless the green land and rivers in the parish, we pray for:

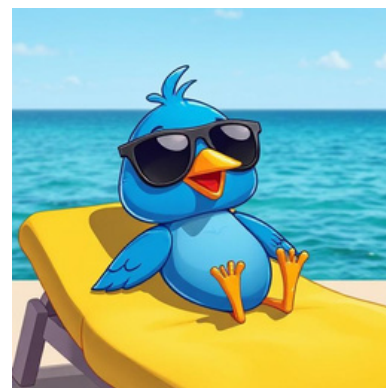

C HURCHYARD BIRDWATCH

The birdwatch had to be on the second Saturday in the month once more, but this time it wasn't because of the weather, it was because it clashed with the church fete and we didn't have the time for watching birds that day.

We met outside church on a cooler morning than we had had of late and we were very glad of it. It was still warm enough for us all to be dressed in short sleeved tops and shorts or cropped trousers but not oppressively so. We wandered around the churchyard at quite a slow pace and saw more birds than we expected given that recent months had not been quite so fruitful. Perhaps the birds were making the most of a cooler morning too.

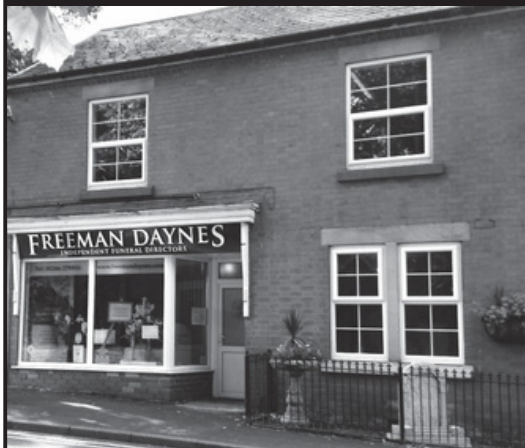
As we reached the Kendal Road end of the churchyard the weather had become warmer but was still much cooler than yesterday. We saw eighteen birds in total. They were woodpigeon, house martin, swift, herring gull, jackdaw – these were all seen from the front of the church before we began our walk around the churchyard. On our walk we saw blackbird, magpie, goldcrest, great tit, crow, robin, two sparrowhawks flying together – a parent and young? – blue tit, goldfinch, wren, house sparrow and nuthatch. Other species seen were a grey squirrel and a speckled wood butterfly.

It was about eleven o'clock by the time we finished but we felt we had had a good morning in the churchyard.

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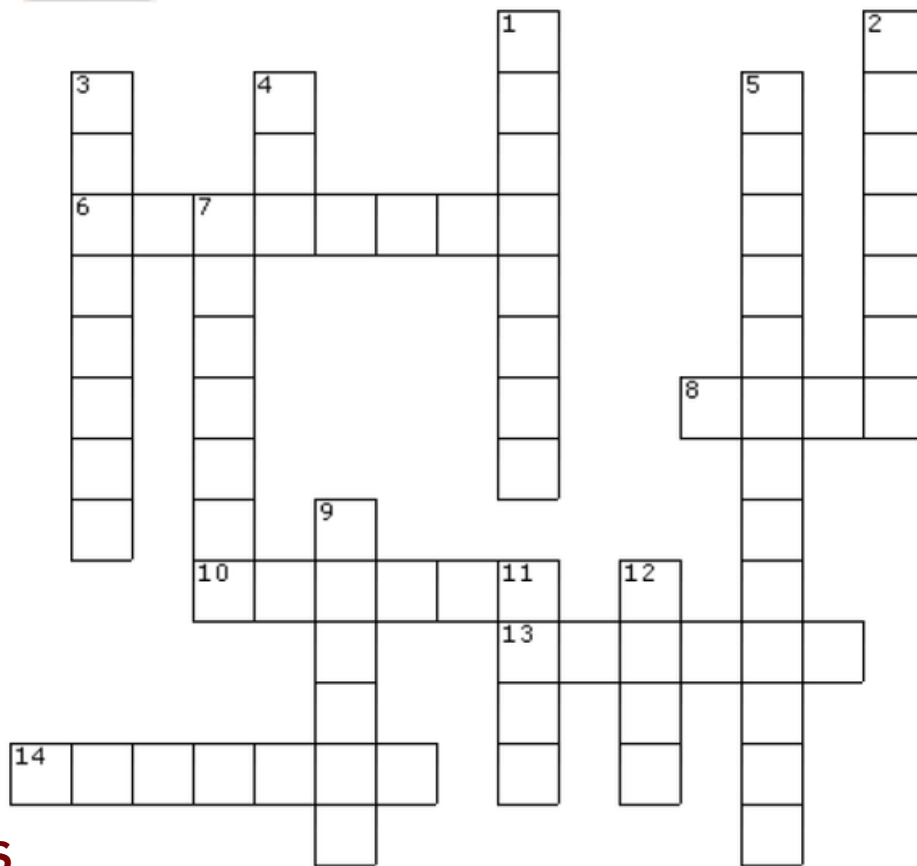

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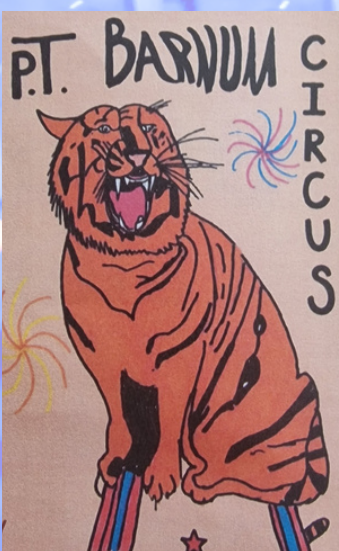
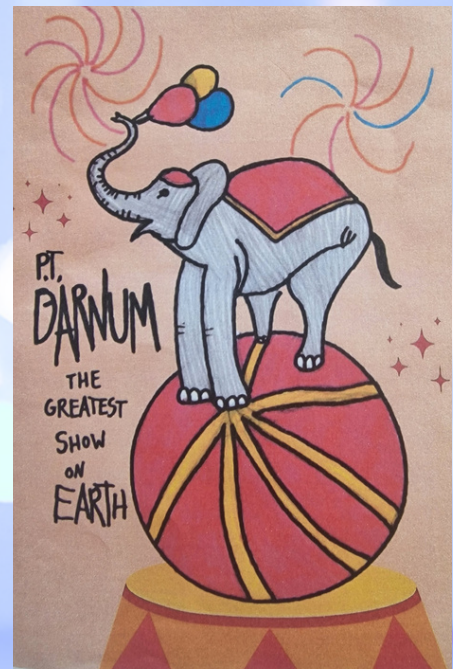
Newbold Church School presents: The Greatest Showman

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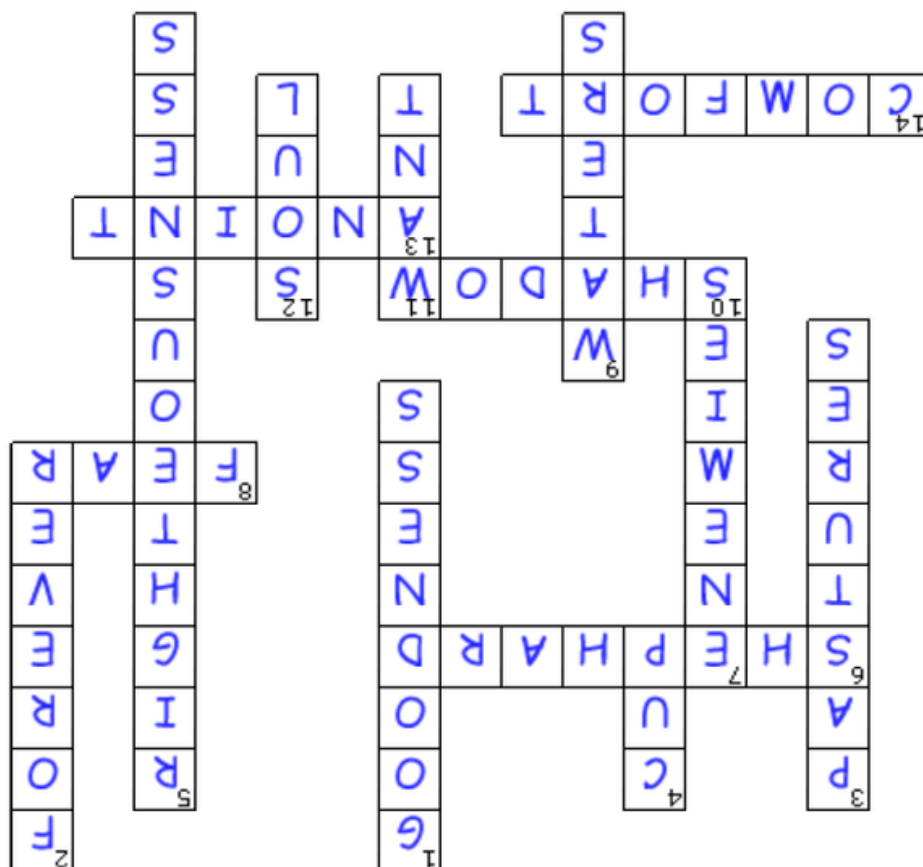

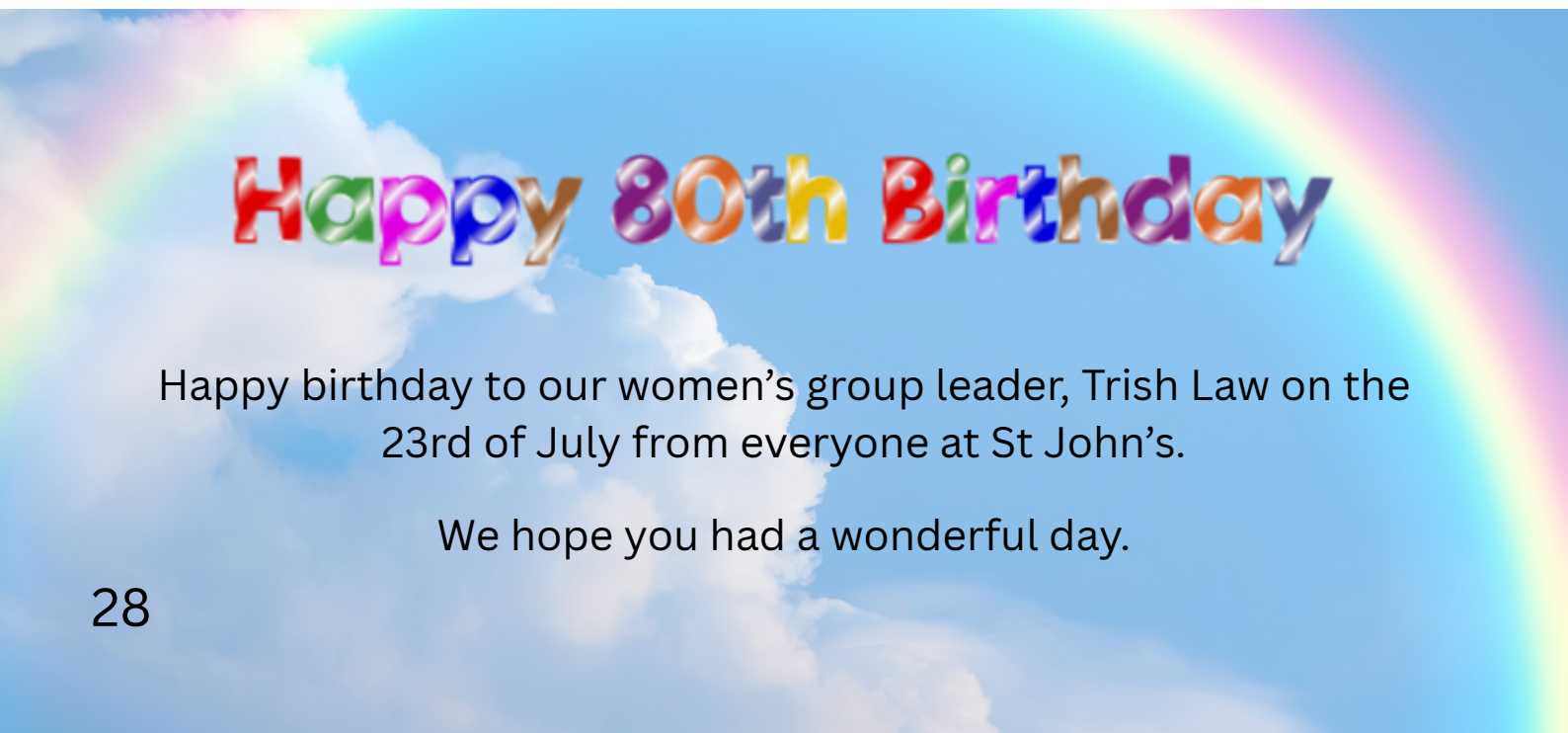

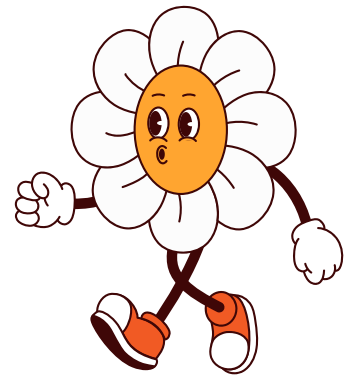

Walking Group

Calver

Chris and Hilary Barnes joined Julie and me for our walk in the area of Calver. We had parked near the Derwent Arms Inn, now closed, perhaps another example of the downhill slope many hospitality businesses are facing.

We arrived at an old-fashioned, cast-iron lamp erected in the middle of the village on a stone plinth, commemorating the coronation of King George V, June 22 1911. On the other side an engraving announced the crowning of Queen Victoria, June 28 1838 and Queen Elizabeth II had her Silver Jubilee 1977, Gold 2002 and Diamond Jubilee 2012. Chris noticed that the engraver had left no space for her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee, held in 2022, to be shown.



We crossed the A623, the main road running from Chesterfield towards Stoney Middleton and were met with the fragrant smell of room diffusers wafting from the Calver Craft Shop and in the Cafe, people were enjoying afternoon tea.

At Calver Mill we learnt that the first mill was built in 1700 but was destroyed by fire and rebuilt on the present site by 1804. The mill produced cotton until 1923 and is now converted into private apartments.

A helicopter flew above us as we inspected an old building and discussed whether it was a former barn, chapel or even a fire station. Chris later found out from his copy of the Peak District Guide that the building used to be a school house. We continued on our walk and on a nearby gate we saw a plaque stating “in gratitude to the life and witness of Revd. Leslie Jacques and Margery Jacques of Wakefield, John 13:34”. No further information has been found on this couple.

We arrived at an expanse of still water – a pond, a lake or a river, we couldn’t decide, but could hear another river close by which was running much faster. It was after we were walking in a wooded area with no sign of wild flowers or the sound of birds, that we could see the weir through the trees - and then it fell into place. The large area of water is a ‘goit’ (a common term used in Derbyshire, ‘leet’ in southern England) and is an artificial watercourse dug to divert water from a main river to power a mill’s water wheel.

Calver Weir is a 19th century, grade II listed structure, built to provide water for cotton spinning at Calver Mill. By holding back water to a height of 3.5 metres, it helps sustain the high water level essential for the survival of the wetlands at Calver Marshes, an important habitat for protected great crested newts. If the weir collapses the water would drain and the land dry out.

We negotiated a small wooden bridge surrounded by the large leafed Gunnera, which looks like rhubarb; the stillness broken by the sound of a chiff chaff. We entered a wild flower meadow, noticing Red Campion, blue Cranes Bill and a display of brilliant blue, daisy-like flowers which Hilary named as chicory. Back in another wooded area, with fever-few nearby and elder flower in bud, we stopped to watch a young retriever dog dash into the water after a stick. Once in the water he changed his mind, swimming straight back and shaking himself vigorously beside us.

Further on, a notice stated the area was important to water voles. As we walked over a bridge we watched a young couple approach in a kayak, so we went to the other side of the bridge and hung over to see them appear beneath us. They noticed us and turned the craft around and retraced their journey. As we



crossed the B625, Julie spotted a scarecrow standing at the side of the road. He was wearing trousers and an orange jacket and holding a 30 mile an hour notice. Perhaps the owners of the nearby bungalow were trying to make a point.



In Curbar, we sat on a stone wall to have a welcome drink before setting off again, this time to get through our first squeeze stile, then between a wooden fence and into a field of long grasses. Two fishermen passed us and cheerfully told us they had caught two brown trout and a grayling. By this time we were on the other side of the river and as we passed some large gardens we saw a silver-coloured statue of an eagle, in a prominent position on a sweeping lawn.

Further along, Chris pointed out a house which had been presented on the TV programme “Escape to the Country” and bought by a couple from Manchester. Eventually, the Bridge Inn came into view and we retraced our steps to the car. We certainly learned a lot on this walk. Thank you to Julie our leader.
